

<p>1 Wednesday, 10 October 2018</p> <p>2 (10.00 am)</p> <p>3 (Proceedings delayed)</p> <p>4 (10.30 am)</p> <p>5 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Good morning, everyone. Welcome to</p> <p>6 today's hearing.</p> <p>7 We are going to hear more evidence from people who</p> <p>8 were in the tower at the time of the fire.</p> <p>9 Yes, Mr Rawat.</p> <p>10 MR RAWAT: Good morning, Mr Chairman.</p> <p>11 Can I first of all apologise for the slightly late</p> <p>12 start. Unfortunately, our first witness this morning</p> <p>13 experienced some transport difficulties coming here.</p> <p>14 Can I now, please, call Samuel Daniels.</p> <p>15 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Thank you.</p> <p>16 SAMUEL DANIELS (sworn)</p> <p>17 Questions by MR RAWAT</p> <p>18 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Thank you very much, Mr Daniels.</p> <p>19 Sit down and make yourself comfortable.</p> <p>20 I'm sorry you got held up, I gather, on the way</p> <p>21 here.</p> <p>22 THE WITNESS: I'm sorry as well.</p> <p>23 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: No, no, it's not your fault, I'm</p> <p>24 sorry you had the problem, but there we are. You are</p> <p>25 here now and we're looking forward to hearing from you.</p> <p>Page 1</p>	<p>1 a plan of the layout of your flat, isn't it?</p> <p>2 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>3 Q. Have you had an opportunity to read your statement</p> <p>4 recently?</p> <p>5 <b>A. I have.</b></p> <p>6 Q. And can you confirm that the contents of the statement</p> <p>7 are true?</p> <p>8 <b>A. To my recollection.</b></p> <p>9 Q. Can I start by explaining what I'd like to cover with</p> <p>10 you today.</p> <p>11 My questions are going to focus on the night of the</p> <p>12 fire, and I appreciate that that's not going to be easy</p> <p>13 to deal with.</p> <p>14 If you feel that you need a break at any time,</p> <p>15 please let me know and we'll stop. There's no rush in</p> <p>16 giving your evidence, so please do take your time.</p> <p>17 I will try and keep my questions short and</p> <p>18 straightforward, but if I do ask you a question which</p> <p>19 you don't understand, just tell me and I'll try to ask</p> <p>20 the question in a different way.</p> <p>21 Thank you.</p> <p>22 Could we just go back to the first page, please, and</p> <p>23 expand paragraphs 1 to 5.</p> <p>24 Could we start, please, Mr Daniels, with some</p> <p>25 background.</p> <p>Page 3</p>
<p>1 Yes, Mr Rawat.</p> <p>2 MR RAWAT: Yes, thank you, Mr Chairman.</p> <p>3 Good morning, Mr Daniels. Can you give the inquiry</p> <p>4 your full name, please.</p> <p>5 <b>A. Samuel Ian Daniels.</b></p> <p>6 Q. Thank you very much for coming to give evidence today.</p> <p>7 The first thing I need to do is formally put your</p> <p>8 statement into evidence, so can we have on the screen,</p> <p>9 please, IWS00000608.</p> <p>10 This is the first page of the statement which you've</p> <p>11 provided to the inquiry. I think you're ahead of me, in</p> <p>12 that you've already picked up that there's a copy of the</p> <p>13 statement in the bundle in front of you, but if you</p> <p>14 prefer using the screen, it will appear on the screen in</p> <p>15 front of you as we go through your evidence.</p> <p>16 <b>A. Okay.</b></p> <p>17 Q. Can we go to the last page, page 15, of that statement,</p> <p>18 please.</p> <p>19 We can see there that the statement is dated</p> <p>20 31 May 2018, and it's signed.</p> <p>21 Can you confirm that this is your signature?</p> <p>22 <b>A. Yes, it is.</b></p> <p>23 Q. There are no exhibits to the statement but, just for the</p> <p>24 record, there is an appendix, which is a floor plan,</p> <p>25 which is on the next page of the statement. That's</p> <p>Page 2</p>	<p>1 It's right, isn't it, that you and your parents</p> <p>2 moved into flat 135 on the 16th floor of Grenfell Tower</p> <p>3 in 1983?</p> <p>4 <b>A. Yes, it is.</b></p> <p>5 Q. You were a year old at the time; is that right?</p> <p>6 <b>A. Yep.</b></p> <p>7 Q. You had a tenancy; was that with RBKC?</p> <p>8 <b>A. My parents did, yes.</b></p> <p>9 Q. At some point in time your mother stopped living at the</p> <p>10 flat, but is it right that your father, Joseph Daniels,</p> <p>11 lived in flat 135 for the rest of his life?</p> <p>12 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>13 Q. You tell us -- we can see that at paragraph 3 on the</p> <p>14 screen -- you lived in the flat for all of your</p> <p>15 childhood, and then, whilst you spent some time away,</p> <p>16 you returned to live with your father in 2012; is that</p> <p>17 right?</p> <p>18 <b>A. Yes, that's right.</b></p> <p>19 Q. And then, because of your father's poor physical and</p> <p>20 mental health, you eventually had to give up work in</p> <p>21 2016 and you then became his full-time carer; is that</p> <p>22 right?</p> <p>23 <b>A. That's correct.</b></p> <p>24 Q. Could I now ask you, please, a few more questions about</p> <p>25 your father's health and, particularly, your father's</p> <p>Page 4</p>

<p>1 health as it was in 2017.</p> <p>2 If I could have the next page of the statement,</p> <p>3 please.</p> <p>4 Let's leave that as it is. If we try and take it in</p> <p>5 stages, Mr Daniels.</p> <p>6 In this part of your statement, you've explained</p> <p>7 that your father had problems with his mobility.</p> <p>8 Was he able to walk up and down stairs?</p> <p>9 <b>A. For a short period, but not more than a couple of</b></p> <p>10 <b>flights.</b></p> <p>11 Q. How long had he been in that condition that meant that</p> <p>12 he could only walk up and down a couple of flights?</p> <p>13 <b>A. Probably about a year and a half.</b></p> <p>14 Q. So if your father had to leave his flat for any reason,</p> <p>15 would he have to use the lift?</p> <p>16 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>17 Q. What would he do if the lift were broken?</p> <p>18 <b>A. He wouldn't be able to leave.</b></p> <p>19 Q. So were there periods of time when your father didn't</p> <p>20 leave the house at all?</p> <p>21 <b>A. Yes, I think for the last two months of his life, he</b></p> <p>22 <b>hadn't left.</b></p> <p>23 Q. So that's April and May 2017.</p> <p>24 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>25 Q. But were there even longer periods that he had to spend</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 5</p>	<p>1 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>2 Q. Could we look at paragraph 9 for a moment, please.</p> <p>3 What you say there is your father suffered from</p> <p>4 diabetes, and you'd requested assistance from social</p> <p>5 services and he had been provided with a number of</p> <p>6 mobility aids.</p> <p>7 Did your father have a social worker in 2017?</p> <p>8 <b>A. No, he didn't.</b></p> <p>9 Q. Can you just expand a little, what was your contact with</p> <p>10 social services at that time?</p> <p>11 <b>A. I didn't have any contact with social services, as far</b></p> <p>12 <b>as I remember. He was diagnosed with dementia by</b></p> <p>13 <b>a nurse. I had to get in -- I forgot the agency they</b></p> <p>14 <b>came through, they might be related to social services,</b></p> <p>15 <b>but I don't think so. I know his name.</b></p> <p>16 Q. But was it through that agency that you then were able</p> <p>17 to get mobility aids for your father?</p> <p>18 <b>A. No, that was through the council, so that would've been</b></p> <p>19 <b>social services.</b></p> <p>20 Q. So did someone come to the flat to speak to you about</p> <p>21 what your father needed?</p> <p>22 <b>A. Yes, they did, yes.</b></p> <p>23 Q. And what then followed was that mobility aids were</p> <p>24 provided?</p> <p>25 <b>A. There were a few mobility aids provided, not as much as</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 7</p>
<p>1 inside the flat?</p> <p>2 <b>A. Not as far as I'm aware.</b></p> <p>3 Q. Could your father manage basic activities like washing?</p> <p>4 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>5 Q. So was it the case at that time that you had to do</p> <p>6 everything for him?</p> <p>7 <b>A. Yes. It's more that he wouldn't, so he had to be</b></p> <p>8 <b>prompted. And getting in and out of the bath was</b></p> <p>9 <b>a difficulty.</b></p> <p>10 Q. If we expand paragraph 11 on the screen, please.</p> <p>11 What you say there is that a lot of your role as his</p> <p>12 carer involved supervision. Your father needed someone</p> <p>13 to look after him to ensure that he remained safe:</p> <p>14 "I reminded him to take his medication. I ensured</p> <p>15 that he ate healthy food. I stopped him from throwing</p> <p>16 things out of the window or engaging in similar</p> <p>17 dangerous activities."</p> <p>18 I'll come back to the issue about throwing things</p> <p>19 out of the window in a while, but, essentially, did you</p> <p>20 have to spend much of your time with your father?</p> <p>21 <b>A. Nearly all of it.</b></p> <p>22 Q. How easy was it to leave him without supervision?</p> <p>23 <b>A. It was a worry. It was a constant worry.</b></p> <p>24 Q. At the time, in 2017, was your father registered</p> <p>25 disabled?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 6</p>	<p>1 <b>I requested.</b></p> <p>2 Q. You've already touched on this, but what we also need to</p> <p>3 understand about your father is that as well as being in</p> <p>4 poor physical health -- you've explained this in your</p> <p>5 statement -- he also suffered with mental health</p> <p>6 problems for many years and had been diagnosed with</p> <p>7 dementia in 2015, hadn't he?</p> <p>8 <b>A. I'm not sure of the date at the moment, but --</b></p> <p>9 Q. Well, let's look at paragraph 10, then, and that may</p> <p>10 help you.</p> <p>11 <b>A. Mm-hm.</b></p> <p>12 Q. What you say is your father had mental health problems</p> <p>13 his whole life:</p> <p>14 "Even when my mum still lived in the flat he would</p> <p>15 throw things out the window, including bookcases and</p> <p>16 chairs ..."</p> <p>17 And at the end you say he developed dementia, which</p> <p>18 was diagnosed in late 2015.</p> <p>19 The throwing things out of the window was a feature</p> <p>20 of your father's mental health difficulties, wasn't it?</p> <p>21 <b>A. I would say so.</b></p> <p>22 Q. What did you have to do to the windows, then, to stop</p> <p>23 him being able to throw things out?</p> <p>24 <b>A. Well, since the refurbishment, they had keys, so you</b></p> <p>25 <b>could lock them. So they were all locked apart from my</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 8</p>

<p>1 <b>bedroom window. The kitchen window could open about</b></p> <p>2 <b>3 inches, so not enough to get anything substantial out</b></p> <p>3 <b>of it.</b></p> <p>4 Q. Because of your father's mental health difficulties, did</p> <p>5 he become confused at times?</p> <p>6 <b>A. Nearly constantly.</b></p> <p>7 Q. What sort of things could disorientate your father?</p> <p>8 <b>A. Banging, drilling, being given new information. Most</b></p> <p>9 <b>things would confuse him.</b></p> <p>10 Q. Was he someone, then, who needed a very rigid routine in</p> <p>11 order not to get distressed or anxious?</p> <p>12 <b>A. I would say he did need a routine, not that -- he didn't</b></p> <p>13 <b>have one.</b></p> <p>14 Q. So did you struggle to try and encourage him to follow</p> <p>15 a routine?</p> <p>16 <b>A. Absolutely.</b></p> <p>17 Q. Taking you back to 2017, you've told us about your</p> <p>18 father's physical difficulties and his mental health</p> <p>19 difficulties.</p> <p>20 Given the state of your father's health, did you</p> <p>21 have any concerns about him living in a flat on the</p> <p>22 16th floor?</p> <p>23 <b>A. Yes, I did.</b></p> <p>24 Q. What were those concerns?</p> <p>25 <b>A. In the event of a fire, he wouldn't be able to escape,</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 9</p>	<p>1 So just to pick up on that last sentence, is it the</p> <p>2 position that the signs you'd seen before the</p> <p>3 refurbishment, as far as you can remember, were not</p> <p>4 there after the refurbishment?</p> <p>5 <b>A. Yes, I don't remember seeing them afterwards, but then</b></p> <p>6 <b>I don't remember them being there before either. I knew</b></p> <p>7 <b>I had seen them before, but once you've seen them, you</b></p> <p>8 <b>don't pay attention to them anymore, so they just blend</b></p> <p>9 <b>into the background.</b></p> <p>10 Q. Who was it that drummed into you that in the event of</p> <p>11 a fire you stay put?</p> <p>12 <b>A. I've got no idea.</b></p> <p>13 Q. But is that very much something that was in your mind</p> <p>14 throughout your time living in Grenfell Tower?</p> <p>15 <b>A. Yes. Yes, I mean, I think there was a fire previously</b></p> <p>16 <b>that I was in, so I think from then onwards I had it in</b></p> <p>17 <b>my head that you had to stay put and put towels</b></p> <p>18 <b>underneath the doors to stop smoke coming in.</b></p> <p>19 Q. I'd like to just show you a photograph, but before I do,</p> <p>20 Mr Chairman, if I could just give the usual warning.</p> <p>21 It's a photograph we've actually seen before. It's</p> <p>22 taken after the fire, but for those who may find any</p> <p>23 such images distressing, if they wish to leave, now</p> <p>24 would be the time.</p> <p>25 But, again, looking at the hearing room, I don't</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 11</p>
<p>1 <b>seeing as you can't use the lifts.</b></p> <p>2 Q. In reality, was that the only way that your father could</p> <p>3 leave his flat?</p> <p>4 <b>A. Yes, without a lot of assistance.</b></p> <p>5 Q. Did you at any time ever try before the fire to get your</p> <p>6 father to come down the stairs?</p> <p>7 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>8 Q. Could I move on, please, to a different topic, and</p> <p>9 that's what you knew about what to do in the event of</p> <p>10 a fire.</p> <p>11 Can I take you to page 4 of your statement and we'll</p> <p>12 look at paragraph 25.</p> <p>13 I am just going to read it out in full, but what you</p> <p>14 say is:</p> <p>15 "25. Before the refurbishment there were signs on</p> <p>16 the landings explaining what to do in event of fire.</p> <p>17 I do not remember ever being given any other information</p> <p>18 about fire safety. I do not recall exactly what the</p> <p>19 signs said. As I had lived in the flat all my life did</p> <p>20 not really pay much attention to them. In childhood it</p> <p>21 had been drummed into me that in the event of fire you</p> <p>22 should 'stay put', unless the fire was in your own flat,</p> <p>23 in which case you should evacuate. I had no reason to</p> <p>24 think that this advice had changed. I do not remember</p> <p>25 the signs being there after the refurbishment."</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 10</p>	<p>1 think there's anyone who feels the need to do so.</p> <p>2 Could we have, please, BLA00002416.</p> <p>3 Just to explain this photograph to you, Mr Daniels,</p> <p>4 it's a photograph of a fire safety notice and it was</p> <p>5 sited between the lifts on the 3rd floor. We can see at</p> <p>6 the top, it says:</p> <p>7 "There is a 'stay put' policy for residents unless</p> <p>8 the fire is in or affecting your flat."</p> <p>9 This is a notice that was there after the</p> <p>10 refurbishment on the 3rd floor.</p> <p>11 The question I'd like to ask you is this: do you</p> <p>12 remember seeing a notice like that on your floor?</p> <p>13 <b>A. No. No.</b></p> <p>14 Q. If we break that down, is it, "No, I don't remember",</p> <p>15 or --</p> <p>16 <b>A. I don't remember seeing that sign anywhere.</b></p> <p>17 Q. You say you don't remember seeing it anywhere; I mean,</p> <p>18 did you see any sign similar to this on any other floor</p> <p>19 in the tower?</p> <p>20 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>21 Q. Going back to what you told us in paragraph 25, in 2017,</p> <p>22 what was your understanding of what you should do as</p> <p>23 a resident in the event of a fire in the tower?</p> <p>24 <b>A. Stay put, unless told to do otherwise.</b></p> <p>25 Q. Again, just for clarity, after the refurbishment, did</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 12</p>

<p>1 you get any advice from any organisation about what to</p> <p>2 do in the event of a fire?</p> <p>3 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>4 Q. Did anyone provide you with any information about what</p> <p>5 you should do as the carer for your father in the event</p> <p>6 of a fire?</p> <p>7 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>8 Q. Did anyone ever discuss with you, as his carer, what</p> <p>9 might be needed should he have to evacuate the building?</p> <p>10 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>11 Q. Can I take you back to your statement. Let's look at</p> <p>12 page 4, and could we expand paragraph 26.</p> <p>13 In this paragraph, Mr Daniels, what you've said is</p> <p>14 that:</p> <p>15 "26. I believed there was a working fire alarm</p> <p>16 system in Grenfell Tower at the time of the fire. There</p> <p>17 always had been in the past and I had no reason to think</p> <p>18 that it would have been removed."</p> <p>19 Again, just to help you, we should also look at</p> <p>20 paragraph 51 of the statement, which is, I think, on</p> <p>21 page 8, please.</p> <p>22 Thank you.</p> <p>23 Have you got paragraph 51, Mr Daniels?</p> <p>24 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>25 Q. Thank you.</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 13</p>	<p>1 looked like a fire alarm?</p> <p>2 <b>A. A smoke detector. So the same smoke detector that had</b></p> <p>3 <b>always been there was still there, as far as I know.</b></p> <p>4 Q. Can we look at an image, then, please, and, again,</p> <p>5 I just warn that this is a photograph taken after the</p> <p>6 fire, but it's a photograph that we have seen recently.</p> <p>7 It's BLA00002513.</p> <p>8 This is a photograph taken on floor 6, so it's not</p> <p>9 your floor, but we can see in the ceiling there what</p> <p>10 looks like a sort of white plastic object. Do you see</p> <p>11 that?</p> <p>12 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>13 Q. Is that what you're thinking of when you say that you</p> <p>14 saw a smoke detector?</p> <p>15 <b>A. Yes, that's the one.</b></p> <p>16 Q. Is that what you're also thinking of when you're saying</p> <p>17 that there was a fire alarm in the communal hallways?</p> <p>18 <b>A. Yes, that's what I'm referring to.</b></p> <p>19 Q. Taking you back to your own floor, was there a detector</p> <p>20 like that on your floor?</p> <p>21 <b>A. There definitely was, yes.</b></p> <p>22 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Could you just help me for a moment</b></p> <p>23 <b>with the bell.</b></p> <p>24 <b>A. Mm-hm.</b></p> <p>25 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Because it sounds as though you</b></p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 15</p>
<p>1 It's just the second sentence there, because what</p> <p>2 you say is:</p> <p>3 "Prior to the refurbishment, if there was a fire in</p> <p>4 the block then you would hear a really loud bell ringing</p> <p>5 outside the front door. It was loud enough to wake you</p> <p>6 if you were asleep. It did not go off that night."</p> <p>7 We'll come back to the events of the night a little</p> <p>8 later on. I just want to ask you some questions about</p> <p>9 the fire alarms.</p> <p>10 When you say that there was a really loud bell</p> <p>11 ringing outside the front door, is that the front door</p> <p>12 of the flat?</p> <p>13 <b>A. Yes, in the communal hallways.</b></p> <p>14 Q. It would ring in your communal hallway; where else would</p> <p>15 it ring?</p> <p>16 <b>A. In all of them.</b></p> <p>17 Q. Would it be also ringing on the ground floor?</p> <p>18 <b>A. I would expect so, but I haven't heard it from the</b></p> <p>19 <b>ground. It's the same alarm as if you're in the lift</b></p> <p>20 <b>and you got stuck, you would press the alarm, and the</b></p> <p>21 <b>bell would go off. So if you held the button down, it</b></p> <p>22 <b>would continually go off. So it was the same alarm. It</b></p> <p>23 <b>was a very loud alarm.</b></p> <p>24 Q. After the refurbishment, did you see anything on your</p> <p>25 landing, in the communal hallway in your floor, that</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 14</p>	<p>1 <b>heard the bell go off a few times while you were living</b></p> <p>2 <b>in your flat.</b></p> <p>3 <b>A. Yes, countless times.</b></p> <p>4 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Did you notice what the bell looked</b></p> <p>5 <b>like? Did you see it?</b></p> <p>6 <b>A. No, you couldn't see the bell, you could just hear it.</b></p> <p>7 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Oh, right.</b></p> <p>8 <b>A. So I'm not sure where it was located.</b></p> <p>9 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Thank you.</b></p> <p>10 <b>A. But I assumed that there was one on each floor because</b></p> <p>11 <b>you could hear it so loudly.</b></p> <p>12 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Yes. Yes, all right, thank you very</b></p> <p>13 <b>much.</b></p> <p>14 <b>MR RAWAT: You'd experienced that bell and that alarm going</b></p> <p>15 <b>off before the refurbishment, hadn't you?</b></p> <p>16 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>17 Q. Did anyone tell you during the course of the</p> <p>18 refurbishment or afterwards that it had been removed?</p> <p>19 <b>A. No. No.</b></p> <p>20 Q. Could we go to what alarms there were in your own flat.</p> <p>21 Did you have smoke alarms fitted in the flat?</p> <p>22 <b>A. Yes, we did, during the refurbishment; we had one put in</b></p> <p>23 <b>the hallway and one in the kitchen.</b></p> <p>24 Q. And in 2017, were those working?</p> <p>25 <b>A. As far as I know, they were.</b></p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 16</p>

<p>1 Q. Did you ever experience them going off at all? For</p> <p>2 example, when you were cooking?</p> <p>3 <b>A. Once my father set off the alarm in the kitchen, burning</b></p> <p>4 <b>some food.</b></p> <p>5 Q. Did you, in addition to those alarms, have a carbon</p> <p>6 monoxide alarm?</p> <p>7 <b>A. I'm not sure.</b></p> <p>8 Q. But can you remember if anyone ever came to the flat to</p> <p>9 give you a carbon monoxide alarm?</p> <p>10 <b>A. No. The Fire Brigade came to the flat and fitted the</b></p> <p>11 <b>two smoke alarms. I'm not sure if one was a carbon</b></p> <p>12 <b>monoxide detector/alarm.</b></p> <p>13 Q. I just want to ask you now some questions about the</p> <p>14 general layout and condition of the flat as it was in</p> <p>15 2017.</p> <p>16 Could I take you, please, to page 6 of your</p> <p>17 statement, and I want to look at paragraph 40.</p> <p>18 I don't need to read it all out, Mr Daniels, but</p> <p>19 I just want to pick up a point, and this is in part of</p> <p>20 your statement where you are discussing the</p> <p>21 refurbishment.</p> <p>22 You say:</p> <p>23 "New front doors were mandatory in all the flats."</p> <p>24 So the front door for your flat was replaced; is</p> <p>25 that right?</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 17</p>	<p>1 Q. By him --</p> <p>2 <b>A. By him removing the middle hinge.</b></p> <p>3 Q. You were there when he did it and saw him do it, did</p> <p>4 you?</p> <p>5 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>6 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Sorry to interrupt you, Mr Rawat.</b></p> <p>7 <b>Before the hinge broke, did the door have</b></p> <p>8 <b>a self-closing mechanism?</b></p> <p>9 <b>A. No. I mean, the door wouldn't close because there were</b></p> <p>10 <b>also problems with the lock.</b></p> <p>11 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Oh, right.</b></p> <p>12 <b>A. So, I mean, it would close by itself, but it wouldn't</b></p> <p>13 <b>lock.</b></p> <p>14 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Right.</b></p> <p>15 <b>A. Not even lock, it wouldn't -- the locks wouldn't go into</b></p> <p>16 <b>place.</b></p> <p>17 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Right. So you had to push it --</b></p> <p>18 <b>A. Push it manually.</b></p> <p>19 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: After the hinge broke, the repair</b></p> <p>20 <b>person removed that central hinge; is that right?</b></p> <p>21 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>22 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: So the door would swing but, again,</b></p> <p>23 <b>the lock wouldn't engage; is that what you're saying?</b></p> <p>24 <b>A. That is, yes.</b></p> <p>25 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Yes. Thank you.</b></p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 19</p>
<p>1 <b>A. Yes, it was.</b></p> <p>2 Q. But what you continue then to say is:</p> <p>3 "... the locking mechanism on my door kept breaking.</p> <p>4 A few months before the fire, one of the hinges came</p> <p>5 out. I called the Tennant[sic] Management Organisation</p> <p>6 repair line and they sent a man out to fix it. He took</p> <p>7 the middle hinge out of the door and said that we would</p> <p>8 need a whole new door. He said he would make a booking</p> <p>9 for a replacement door to be fitted but it never got</p> <p>10 changed. This meant that even though they were supposed</p> <p>11 to be self-closing doors, mine was not self-closing at</p> <p>12 the time of the fire."</p> <p>13 Is that right?</p> <p>14 <b>A. That is right.</b></p> <p>15 Q. So you were aware before the fire that the new door that</p> <p>16 had been fitted was meant to be self-closing?</p> <p>17 <b>A. Not at the time, only since.</b></p> <p>18 Q. So when this repairman came to fix the problem with the</p> <p>19 locking mechanism, what effect did that have on how you</p> <p>20 could use the door?</p> <p>21 <b>A. Well, to elaborate, the door wouldn't close when the</b></p> <p>22 <b>hinge broke, so the middle hinge bent, or the screws</b></p> <p>23 <b>bent that were holding it in, so the door wouldn't close</b></p> <p>24 <b>at all, so I had to phone them. And the effect it had</b></p> <p>25 <b>was I could close the door.</b></p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 18</p>	<p>1 MR RAWAT: Picking up on the chairman's last point, so even</p> <p>2 after the repairman had come to close the door, you</p> <p>3 would have to physically pull it shut, would you?</p> <p>4 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>5 Q. To make sure that it had locked?</p> <p>6 <b>A. Yes, you would.</b></p> <p>7 Q. Do you remember any draught problems with the door?</p> <p>8 <b>A. No. No. I mean, there was no wind in the communal</b></p> <p>9 <b>hallway, or on my floor, so, no. I mean, you could</b></p> <p>10 <b>smell your neighbours' cooking, but that's about it.</b></p> <p>11 Q. So we can understand what the door looked like, this was</p> <p>12 a door that had a letterbox in it; is that right?</p> <p>13 <b>A. Yes, it did.</b></p> <p>14 Q. If we could look now at paragraph 41, please.</p> <p>15 This is again where you're discussing the changes</p> <p>16 that were brought in place during the refurbishment, but</p> <p>17 you described a boiler system, which you described as</p> <p>18 an enormous boiler system, was installed in each flat</p> <p>19 and new pipes were fitted.</p> <p>20 Can I bring up your plan, please, it's IWS00000608,</p> <p>21 page 16.</p> <p>22 Can you, using that, just help us with where the new</p> <p>23 boiler was placed?</p> <p>24 <b>A. So in the entrance, just on your left, the boiler would</b></p> <p>25 <b>be about a foot inside the front door.</b></p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 20</p>

<p>1 Q. So before we reach the door that would allow you to get 2 into the box room? 3 <b>A. Yes.</b> 4 Q. So you now had a boiler placed in your entrance hall. 5 Did that have any effect on how easy it was to come 6 in and out of the front door? 7 <b>A. Not for me, but for my father it probably had an effect, 8 probably hindered his movement.</b> 9 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Just help me again. Imagine</b> 10 <b>yourself standing outside your front door, about to walk</b> 11 <b>in.</b> 12 <b>A. Yes.</b> 13 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Was the boiler on the left side or</b> 14 <b>the right side?</b> 15 <b>A. It was on the left.</b> 16 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Thank you.</b> 17 MR RAWAT: If we take you back to your statement, page 7, 18 please. Again, expand paragraphs 41 and 42, please. 19 You say there: 20 "The pipes were left exposed, running through the 21 flats. Inside my flat, an exposed hot water pipe ran 22 from my father's room through my room and into the 23 living room." 24 Were there still exposed pipes running into your 25 flat in June 2017?</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 21</p>	<p>1 <b>I think they were filled. We didn't have gas in my</b> 2 <b>flat, so ...</b> 3 <b>Yes, I'm not sure. I'm not sure.</b> 4 Q. So you can't remember there being any holes from the 5 communal hallway into your flat? 6 <b>A. No, I can, but I think they were filled up with some</b> 7 <b>kind of filler.</b> 8 MR RAWAT: Thank you. 9 Mr Chairman, may I ask now for just a short break? 10 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Yes. Right. 11 Well, we have a break from time to time, Mr Daniels, 12 for all sorts of different reasons. We are going to 13 have one now. 14 How long do you want, 10 minutes? 15 MR RAWAT: 10 minutes maximum. 16 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: All right. 17 So we'll stop until, let's say, 11.15. <p>1 <b>A. I don't know about running in, but running through, so</b> 2 <b>through the bedrooms and the living room.</b> 3 Q. Did they run along the tops of the walls or along the 4 bottom? 5 <b>A. No, along the bottom.</b> 6 Q. If they were running through your flat, where were they 7 coming from, the pipes? 8 <b>A. I'm guessing the neighbours' flat.</b> 9 Q. Obviously for the pipe to run through, there would need 10 to be a hole in the wall. 11 Was there a tight seal around the holes where the 12 pipes were running through? 13 <b>A. No.</b> 14 Q. Can you describe what the holes were like, please? 15 <b>A. Crude holes drilled through the walls that were too</b> 16 <b>large for the pipes.</b> 17 Q. How big were the pipes? 18 <b>A. I'd say an inch or two. Yes, an inch or two.</b> 19 Q. Were these like -- can we imagine like the sort of pipes 20 you have running to radiators? 21 <b>A. Those pipes exactly, yes.</b> 22 Q. Above the front door, there were some holes made, but</b></p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 22</p>	<p>1 (11.21 am) 2 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: All right, Mr Daniels? 3 THE WITNESS: Yes. 4 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Ready to keep going? 5 THE WITNESS: Yes. 6 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: All right, thank you very much. 7 Yes, Mr Rawat. 8 MR RAWAT: Thank you, Mr Chairman. 9 Mr Daniels, before we had the short break, I was 10 asking you questions about the condition of your flat in 11 2017, and I'd like to just ask you a few more questions 12 on that topic, please. 13 Can I take you now to paragraph 43 in your 14 statement, which is on page 7. 15 In that statement, you're talking about the windows 16 that were fitted as part of the refurbishment, and it's 17 right, isn't it, that in your flat you had all the 18 windows replaced? 19 <b>A. Just so that we can kind of orientate ourselves, let's</p> <p>6 look at your plan quickly, page 16.</p> <p>7 We have two bedrooms marked on there, bedroom 1 and</p> <p>8 bedroom 2. Which one was your bedroom?</p> <p>9 <b>A. Bedroom 2.</b></p> <p>10 Q. Was your bedroom window the only window in the flat</p> <p>11 where you would feel a draught?</p> <p>12 <b>A. As far as I remember.</b></p> <p>13 Q. In relation to your bedroom window, where was the</p> <p>14 draught coming in?</p> <p>15 <b>A. At the bottom of the frame. So in between the wall and</b></p> <p>16 <b>the frame.</b></p> <p>17 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Underneath the windowsill?</b></p> <p>18 <b>A. Underneath the windowsill, yes.</b></p> <p>19 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Thank you.</b></p> <p>20 MR RAWAT: Can you say how strong that draught was?</p> <p>21 <b>A. Depending on the conditions, it was ... it was enough to</b></p> <p>22 <b>be noticeable even in a mild wind.</b></p> <p>23 Q. You've spoken of the communal hallway.</p> <p>24 Did you know in June 2017 if there was a ventilation</p> <p>25 system in the communal hallway?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 25</p>	<p>1 <b>A. Sorry, after the refurbishment?</b></p> <p>2 Q. Yes.</p> <p>3 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>4 Q. Even by cigarette smoke?</p> <p>5 <b>A. No. I wish I'd have tested it now, but no.</b></p> <p>6 Q. You've told us you had two smoke alarms in your flat,</p> <p>7 one in the hallway, one in the kitchen.</p> <p>8 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>9 Q. How sensitive were those?</p> <p>10 <b>A. As I said, the kitchen one went off once, and there was</b></p> <p>11 <b>quite a lot of smoke in the kitchen at that time, so</b></p> <p>12 <b>I couldn't really judge how sensitive they were.</b></p> <p>13 Q. What I'd like to do now, Mr Daniels, is to turn to the</p> <p>14 events of the night themselves. But let's stick with</p> <p>15 that plan that we were just looking at. It's helpful if</p> <p>16 we just start off by understanding the layout of your</p> <p>17 flat.</p> <p>18 <b>A. Mm-hm.</b></p> <p>19 Q. <p>1 <b>A. There were always vents in the communal hallway.</b></p> <p>2 <b>I didn't know the purpose of them, ever. I assumed they</b></p> <p>3 <b>were for getting smoke out and having fresh air in the</b></p> <p>4 <b>communal areas.</b></p> <p>5 Q. When you were in the communal areas, other than just</p> <p>6 using it as a route to your flat, did you ever spend</p> <p>7 time standing outside the communal areas, for example,</p> <p>8 having a cigarette or something like that?</p> <p>9 <b>A. Yes, and we set off the fire alarm, the communal fire</b></p> <p>10 <b>alarm.</b></p> <p>11 Q. Let's come back to that in a moment then.</p> <p>12 When you were out there, in the communal area, did</p> <p>13 you ever feel the movement of air at all?</p> <p>14 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>15 Q. Did you ever hear the sound of a fan?</p> <p>16 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>17 Q. You just mentioned that when you were out in the</p> <p>18 communal hallway having a cigarette, you would set off</p> <p>19 the fire alarm.</p> <p>20 <b>A. Yes. One of my friends, not me.</b></p> <p>21 Q. Right. Was that after the refurbishment?</p> <p>22 <b>A. No, previously.</b></p> <p>23 Q. So after the refurbishment and around June 2017, were</p> <p>24 you ever aware of that alarm that we looked at being set</p> <p>25 off on your floor?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 26</p>	<p>1 look out onto Kensington Aldridge Academy, the school?</p> <p>2 <b>A. Yes, you could.</b></p> <p>3 Q. We can see doors coming off that open into the sitting</p> <p>4 room and the two bedrooms, and there's a hallway there,</p> <p>5 is there, running along to the entrance; is that right?</p> <p>6 <b>A. Yes, correct.</b></p> <p>7 Q. Let's go back, then, to the statement and page 8.</p> <p>8 If we could just expand paragraphs 47 to 50, please.</p> <p>9 You explain that on that night, soon after midnight,</p> <p>10 you were lying in bed and you were browsing the</p> <p>11 internet. You've put, if you look at paragraph 48:</p> <p>12 "48. I think I first became aware of the fire at</p> <p>13 approximately 12.45am."</p> <p>14 We'll look at what you noticed at that time, but can</p> <p>15 I start off by asking you this question: what do you</p> <p>16 base your time of 12.45 on?</p> <p>17 <b>A. The subsequent events after that, so me leaving the</b></p> <p>18 <b>tower block.</b></p> <p>19 Q. So is it a case of working back in your mind?</p> <p>20 <b>A. Yes, I worked back from the time I left the block.</b></p> <p>21 Q. Thank you.</p> <p>22 At that time, what you say is that you began to</p> <p>23 smell smoke.</p> <p>24 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>25 Q. Was your bedroom window open at the time?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 28</p>

<p>1 <b>A. I doubt it -- oh, it could well have been, yes. On</b>  2 <b>a night like that. I can't remember, but probably was.</b>  3 Q. And if we look at paragraph 48, what you describe the  4 smoke as is:  5 "It smelt electrical. I thought maybe it was an  6 issue with a plug socket or that had dropped a lit  7 cigarette on my bed. It wasn't a smell that I was used  8 to. It was similar to the smell when you drop a  9 cigarette and it starts to burn on a mattress, but not  10 quite the same."  11 You explain that you checked over the room but  12 couldn't find the source of the smell.  13 Did you have any sense of where it might be coming  14 from into your bedroom?  15 <b>A. I thought it was in my property, so I checked around my</b>  16 <b>property, the living room. I thought my father might</b>  17 <b>have left the oven on or burnt something or a socket had</b>  18 <b>been overloaded. Once I couldn't locate it in my house,</b>  19 <b>I had no idea where it was coming from.</b>  20 Q. So, again, breaking that down, what you did at that  21 time, then, was not only to check in your bedroom, but  22 around the property?  23 <b>A. Yes.</b>  24 Q. Which other rooms in the flat did you look at?  25 <b>A. The living room, the kitchen, hallway.</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 29</p>	<p>1 <b>A. It was mainly in my bedroom. I can't remember it being</b>  2 <b>anywhere else at the beginning of the evening.</b>  3 Q. When you got to the kitchen, could you smell any smoke  4 in the kitchen itself?  5 <b>A. Not that I remember, no.</b>  6 Q. And the smell hadn't changed at all in the 20 minutes  7 that had passed since you first noticed it?  8 <b>A. No.</b>  9 Q. If we look at paragraph 50, what you say there -- I'll  10 try to summarise it -- is that you looked out of the  11 kitchen window and saw flickering on the panels of the  12 new school in front of the block.  13 <b>A. That's incorrect, it should be the living room window.</b>  14 Q. I see.  15 So was this something that you did the first time  16 you'd noticed a smell?  17 <b>A. <p>1 Q. And that didn't help you at all with trying to work out  2 where the smell was coming from?  3 <b>A. No, the smell was only in my room as far as I can</b>  4 <b>remember, at that time.</b>  5 Q. So what you were left with was a smell that you were  6 able to say was in your room but you couldn't tell what  7 was causing it or where it was coming from?  8 <b>A. Yes, exactly.</b>  9 Q. If we look at 49, you say that:  10 "49. After about 20 minutes, I was still  11 occasionally getting whiffs of the smell."  12 Had the smell lessened by then or was it getting  13 stronger or ...?  14 <b>A. It was much the same. As you made your way from your bedroom to your kitchen,  24 did you pick up the smell in the hallway or anywhere  25 else, or was it still very much still in your bedroom?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 30</p>	<p>1 <b>A. Mm-hm.</b>  2 Q. You pick up on this smell. You checked your bedroom.  3 <b>A. Yes.</b>  4 Q. That didn't help you to identify where the smell was  5 coming from.  6 <b>A. No.</b>  7 Q. Then you looked in the living room to see whether it was  8 elsewhere in the flat.  9 <b>A. Mm-hm.</b>  10 Q. Again, you couldn't tell where the smell was coming  11 from.  12 <b>A. Yes, that's correct.</b>  13 Q. Then did you go back to your bedroom after that?  14 <b>A. Yes, I did, yes.</b>  15 Q. Was it after that that you thought, because you were  16 still getting occasional whiffs of a smell, you needed  17 to look around again?  18 <b>A. Yes, exactly. But I felt very safe because the alarm</b>  19 <b>wasn't going off, so I thought all was well.</b>  20 Q. If we look at paragraph 50 -- and you're right, what you  21 say it should read is "I looked out of the living room  22 window".  23 <b>A. Yes, that's right.</b>  24 Q. You now have a memory of looking out of the living room  25 window and seeing flickering on the panels of the</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 32</p>



<p>1 school?</p> <p>2 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>3 Q. But at that time, is it also right that your thought was</p> <p>4 that if it was a fire, it was outside the block?</p> <p>5 <b>A. Yes. I thought it was in front of the sports centre or</b></p> <p>6 <b>under the walkway, where there are rubbish bins.</b></p> <p>7 <b>Sometimes kids would set them on fire or burn mopeds,</b></p> <p>8 <b>something like that.</b></p> <p>9 Q. After another ten minutes, the smell became</p> <p>19 stronger."</p> <p>20 Again, just to try and break that down a little bit,</p> <p>21 is it your recollection that there was sort of</p> <p>22 10 minutes where nothing happened and then you began to</p> <p>23 notice that the smell was getting stronger?</p> <p>24 <b>A. Yes. That's how I remember it.</b></p> <p>25 Q. How quickly did the smell become stronger?</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 33</p>	<p>1 <b>panels.</b></p> <p>2 Q. In that period of time, a number of things have</p> <p>3 happened, haven't they? The smell's got stronger in</p> <p>4 your flat.</p> <p>5 <b>A. Mm-hm.</b></p> <p>6 Q. <p>1 can you describe the smell that was in the communal 2 corridor?</p> <p>3 <b>A. The same smell.</b></p> <p>4 Q. We know that there are lights in that landing area. 5 Were the lights on?</p> <p>6 <b>A. Yes, they were working.</b></p> <p>7 Q. Other than this faint smell of smoke, did you have any 8 idea of where that smoke might be coming from?</p> <p>9 <b>A. No, I had no idea where it was coming from. I assumed 10 it was in the block, and then I was puzzled as to why 11 the alarm wasn't ringing.</b></p> <p>12 Q. By the alarm, are you referring to that detector we saw 13 on the ceiling?</p> <p>14 <b>A. Yes, the communal alarm.</b></p> <p>15 Q. Can we have paragraphs 52 to 54. 16 Just picking up, please, Mr Daniels, on the last 17 sentence of paragraph 52, where you say: 18 "I walked around a bit but could not see 19 anything ..." 20 So whereabouts did you walk?</p> <p>21 <b>A. In the communal hallway and the stairs.</b></p> <p>22 Q. So taking the communal hallway first, did you walk, for 23 example, past the lifts?</p> <p>24 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>25 Q. At that time, was there anybody else in the communal</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 37</p>	<p>1 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>2 Q. You say he was reading, so he was awake when you came 3 into his bedroom, was he?</p> <p>4 <b>A. Yes, he was.</b></p> <p>5 Q. You say that you told him there was a fire. He was 6 confused. He did not believe that there was a fire. 7 Do you think your father was able to understand that 8 there was a fire?</p> <p>9 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>10 Q. So what was it that was making him confused?</p> <p>11 <b>A. I just don't think he believed me.</b></p> <p>12 <b>He was generally confused. So at that time in the 13 evening, he probably was tired and it was just hard to 14 communicate with him on most issues.</b></p> <p>15 Q. What you do say -- you've explained, of course, his 16 bedroom window had to be locked.</p> <p>17 <b>A. Mm-hm.</b></p> <p>18 Q. But you think when you took him to the window, he was 19 able to see some of the fire?</p> <p>20 <b>A. At some stage, he was, yes.</b></p> <p>21 Q. If I draw your attention just to the last part of 22 paragraph 54 there.</p> <p>23 <b>A. Mm-hm.</b></p> <p>24 Q. You say you'd locked his bedroom door to prevent him 25 from throwing things out:</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 39</p>
<p>1 hallway?</p> <p>2 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>3 Q. You just mentioned you went onto the stairs. Did you 4 actually open the door to the stairs and go out there?</p> <p>5 <b>A. Yes, I did.</b></p> <p>6 Q. Again, just breaking it down, when you had to open the 7 door to step into the stairwell, do you remember doing 8 that?</p> <p>9 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>10 Q. What was it like in the stairwell at that time?</p> <p>11 <b>A. Completely normal.</b></p> <p>12 Q. So was there a smell in the stairwell?</p> <p>13 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>14 Q. Again, you tell us that you went back to the flat and 15 closed the door. 16 If we look at 53: 17 "53. I returned to the front room and looked out of 18 the window again. The flames in the reflection on the 19 panels of the school were bigger and I realized that the 20 fire must be growing." 21 So you're looking out here from your living room; is 22 that right?</p> <p>23 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>24 Q. In 54, what you then go on to tell us is that you now 25 went to try to explain to your father what was going on.</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 38</p>	<p>1 "... and due to his limited mobility he struggled to 2 see where I was looking as he could not look down 3 easily. However, I think he was able to see some of the 4 fire."</p> <p>5 So do you remember trying to take your father to the 6 window to show him what was going on?</p> <p>7 <b>A. Yes, I remember that.</b></p> <p>8 Q. You also say that you told your father, and you say that 9 in that paragraph, that you might need to leave the 10 building?</p> <p>11 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>12 Q. What was it that made you think that you might need to 13 do that?</p> <p>14 <b>A. That there was a fire in the block. So I wasn't paying 15 much respect to the stay-put advice given.</b></p> <p>16 Q. You told us earlier that that was something that had 17 been drummed into you and you were aware of.</p> <p>18 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>19 Q. But what was it that was making you decide not to pay 20 much respect to the stay-put policy?</p> <p>21 <b>A. Probably my personality, but also the fact that the 22 alarm hadn't gone off and there was clearly smoke in the 23 block.</b></p> <p>24 Q. You'd spoken earlier about your concerns over your 25 father, given his health, living on the 16th floor.</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 40</p>

<p>1 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>2 Q. Had you before made any kind of assessment of the risks</p> <p>3 that there were for your father living on that floor?</p> <p>4 <b>A. I did to myself constantly, but I'm not sure if I said</b></p> <p>5 <b>anything to social services or the council about it.</b></p> <p>6 Q. Was that assessment part of your thinking about the need</p> <p>7 to leave the building?</p> <p>8 <b>A. I don't remember, but in all likelihood.</b></p> <p>9 Q. Can we now look at paragraph 55, please. We're now</p> <p>10 looking, Mr Daniels, at the second time that you go back</p> <p>11 to your front door.</p> <p>12 What you say is that:</p> <p>13 "55. I then opened the front door of our flat</p> <p>14 again. So you could see through some of the smoke, could you?</p> <p>5 <b>A. Yes, it was a lot thicker than it had been previously,</b></p> <p>6 <b>but it wasn't that dense.</b></p> <p>7 Q. Were you aware of anyone else in the communal hallway at</p> <p>8 that time?</p> <p>9 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>10 Q. If we pick it up at the next sentence, you say:</p> <p>11 "I walked to the stairs and I could faintly hear</p> <p>12 shouting and panicking."</p> <p>13 Did you actually go into the stairwell again?</p> <p>14 <b>A. My one certainly did, on my floor.</b></p> <p>4 Q. So you tell us that you went into the stairwell.</p> <p>5 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>6 Q. What were the conditions like in the stairwell when you</p> <p>7 went there?</p> <p>8 <b>A. Clear.</b></p> <p>9 Q. When you stepped into the stairwell, did you allow the</p> <p>10 stairwell door to close behind you?</p> <p>11 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>12 Q. Did any of the smoke that you had noticed on the</p> <p>13 communal hallway come into the stairwell?</p> <p>14 <b>A. Not as far as I'm aware, no.</b></p> <p>15 Q. I just want to ask you a question about the last</p> <p>16 sentence in this paragraph, because you say:</p> <p>17 "I think that one of the lifts was out of order that</p> <p>18 night, but I saw someone going down in the other lift."</p> <p>19 Can you just help us with this: what did you</p> <p>20 actually see?</p> <p>21 <b>A. I saw on the panels which show which floor the lift was</b></p> <p>22 <b>on, I saw it go to a floor and then descend.</b></p> <p>23 Q. So when you say --</p> <p>24 <b>A. I assumed. I assumed somebody was in the lift and</b></p> <p>25 <b>using it.</b></p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 44</p>

<p>1 Q. So when you say you saw it go to a floor, did you see 2 the lift travel up to a floor?</p> <p>3 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>4 Q. I know it's difficult, but are you able to say what 5 floor that was?</p> <p>6 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>7 Q. Obviously a floor higher than your own?</p> <p>8 <b>A. Not necessarily.</b></p> <p>9 Q. I follow. So what you'd seen was the lift moving 10 upwards --</p> <p>11 <b>A. Mm-hm.</b></p> <p>12 Q. -- and then moving down again.</p> <p>13 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>14 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Was that from the indicator?</b></p> <p>15 <b>A. Yes, above the lift doors, we had an indicator.</b></p> <p>16 <b>SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Yes.</b></p> <p>17 MR RAWAT: When you were in the stairwell, what you say is 18 that you could faintly hear shouting and panicking.</p> <p>19 Can you help us at all with where that shouting and 20 panicking was coming from?</p> <p>21 <b>A. I think it was -- hmm, I couldn't be sure right now.</b></p> <p>22 Q. Do you have a sense of it coming from above you or 23 below?</p> <p>24 <b>A. I vaguely remember it coming from above, but I can't be 25 sure about that.</b></p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 45</p>	<p>1 the east corner. However, it was much lower down the 2 building at about the 4th to 6th floor."</p> <p>3 <b>A. I think that should be the north side. So it had come 4 round to the north side.</b></p> <p>5 Q. Let's do it using your plan. Let's go to page 16.</p> <p>6 So what you've done is gone back to the flat and 7 back to the sitting room, haven't you?</p> <p>8 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>9 Q. By then, what you've done was you've come out of your 2 front door, into the communal hallway, you've noticed 3 what was going on with the lifts, and you've gone to the 4 stairwell?</p> <p>5 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>6 Q. Did you have any sense of where this thick, dark smoke 7 was coming from?</p> <p>8 <b>A. No idea.</b></p> <p>9 Q. Could we look at paragraph 56, please.</p> <p>10 <b>A. Sorry, I mean, at this stage, I did probably think it 11 was inside the block, seeing as the smoke was inside the 12 block, but no idea in the block where it was coming 13 from.</b></p> <p>14 Q. Did you see anything coming out of the lifts?</p> <p>15 <b>A. No, I didn't.</b></p> <p>16 Q. Or through any of the --</p> <p>17 <b>A. The vents, I didn't.</b></p> <p>18 Q. -- grilles or anything?</p> <p>19 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>20 Q. Same page, we've got it up on the screen, it's 21 paragraph 56, because what you tell us you then did was 22 to go back to the flat and back to the front room, and 23 you saw that:</p> <p>24 "... the fire had come around the corner so there 25 was now fire on our side of the block, to the right on</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 46</p>	<p>1 Q. Were you seeing any smoke at all?</p> <p>2 <b>A. No. It was dark, so it's hard to see smoke in the 3 night.</b></p> <p>4 Q. Was that the first time that you had an indication that 5 there was fire on the outside of the block?</p> <p>6 <b>A. I didn't know it was on the outside. I assumed it was 7 coming out of a property window at around the 5th floor. 8 I didn't know it was on the outside of the block, apart 9 from protruding through the window.</b></p> <p>10 Q. I'll take you to the next paragraph on this same page,</p> <p>10 please, paragraph 58.</p> <p>11 This is now the third time, isn't it, that you go</p> <p>12 back to your front door and out into that hallway.</p> <p>13 <b>A. They were clear.</b></p> <p>3 Q. So no smoke or anything at all in the stairwell?</p> <p>4 <b>A. Nothing of note, no.</b></p> <p>5 Q. Any smell of any kind?</p> <p>6 <b>A. No, because I'm coming from a smoky environment into --</b></p> <p>7 <b>so it was like fresh air, it was ...</b></p> <p>8 Q. The East African woman from one of the higher floors,</p> <p>9 was that the only person that you saw at the time in the</p> <p>10 stairwell?</p> <p>11 <b>A. At that time, yes.</b></p> <p>12 Q. Could you hear any shouting at all?</p> <p>13 <b>A. It was eerily quiet apart from her.</b></p> <p>14 Q. Was she someone that you recognised?</p> <p>15 <b>A. I've seen her before, yes.</b></p> <p>16 Q. You say that she was from one of the higher floors; did</p> <p>17 you know which floor she lived on?</p> <p>18 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>19 Q. Let's now look at paragraphs 59 and 60 of that</p> <p>20 statement, same page, page 10, please.</p> <p>21 If I may, Mr Daniels, I'll read some of this out.</p> <p>22 You tell us:</p> <p>23 "59. I went back to my father and told him he had</p> <p>24 to put his shoes on as we needed to leave. What were the conditions like in the stairwell on this</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 50</p>	<p>1 He was asking why we had to leave. I explained that the</p> <p>2 fire was on our side of the block. He is very stubborn</p> <p>3 and was not moving quickly. He was also very confused.</p> <p>4 He asked me to show him the fire. We got as close to</p> <p>5 the window as possible and then from below us to the</p> <p>6 right, a wave of fire shot past the window."</p> <p>7 So the first question is: how long do you think it</p> <p>8 took for you to try to explain to your father what was</p> <p>9 going on?</p> <p>10 <b>A. It seemed like an eternity, but it was probably a matter</b></p> <p>11 <b>of minutes, 2/3 minutes.</b></p> <p>12 Q. Did you notice smoke of that consistency in the hallway</p> <p>3 when you were walking out to the front door?</p> <p>4 <b>A. No, no.</b></p> <p>5 Q. Could I have 61 down to the</p> <p>18 remaining paragraphs on the page.</p> <p>19 Mr Daniels, I'm just going to sort of summarise the</p> <p>20 paragraphs, if I may, but what then happened was that</p> <p>21 you shouted to your father, but you say he was</p> <p>22 disorientated and frozen in a daze. Just that there are things that are not in this, which</b></p> <p>7 <b>are I did see Maher in the stairs as well with the</b></p> <p>8 <b>fireman, and I said to the fireman -- you know, because</b></p> <p>9 <b>he's disabled, so I did say to the fireman, "How is he</b></p> <p>10 <b>going to get out?" and he shrugged his shoulders. We don't need to bring any of 21 them up, but for the record, they are your exhibit BL/1, 22 IWS00000770, page 17; exhibit BL/2, IWS00000770, 23 page 19; and exhibit BL/3, IWS00000770, page 21. <p>1 willingness to continue to help the inquiry. 2 I'm going to try and keep my questions short and 3 straightforward, but if I do ask you a question which 4 you don't understand, please just tell me and I'll try 5 to ask the question in a different way. 6 If you feel you need a break, please let us know and 7 we'll stop. 8 Most importantly, please just do take your time, 9 because your answers to the questions are very 10 important. 11 The first thing I need to do is to formally put your 12 witness statement into the record. Can I bring up the 13 first page, please. <p>1 you've marked there who lived in which flat. In</p> <p>2 particular, we can see that flat 84 is in the middle of</p> <p>3 the floor, isn't it?</p> <p>4 <b>A. It is.</b></p> <p>5 Q. Behind the lifts.</p> <p>6 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>7 Q. I want to ask you briefly some general questions about</p> <p>8 the flat and the floor, and those arise from your</p> <p>9 statement.</p> <p>10 Can I take you back to page 3 of the statement, and</p> <p>11 look at paragraph 13, please.</p> <p>12 What you've told us Mr Lukic in paragraph 13 is:</p> <p>13 "13. I do remember there being two big vents in the</p> <p>14 communal hallways which I think were supposed to clear</p> <p>15 smoke. I remember at one point some people came to</p> <p>16 inspect them or service them. That was either around</p> <p>17 the time or shortly after the refurbishment. After</p> <p>18 this, the vents looked newer than they used to — I don't</p> <p>19 know whether they cleaned them or replaced some of the</p> <p>20 parts, but I remember afterwards I would sometimes hear</p> <p>21 noises coming from the vents."</p> <p>22 I want to show you two photographs, and,</p> <p>23 Mr Chairman, these are photographs that we've seen</p> <p>24 before with the other witnesses.</p> <p>25 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: They are not particularly</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 81</p>	<p>1 Do you see there now?</p> <p>2 <b>A. Yes, yes.</b></p> <p>3 Q. Is that what you remember?</p> <p>4 <b>A. Exactly, yes. That was on my side of the communal area.</b></p> <p>5 <b>It was positioned down lower.</b></p> <p>6 Q. You say in that paragraph that I read out that two big</p> <p>7 vents -- and I quote you -- "I think were supposed to</p> <p>8 clear smoke."</p> <p>9 What made you think that they were there to clear</p> <p>10 smoke?</p> <p>11 <b>A. In the event of the fire, as what we experienced on the</b></p> <p>12 <b>night, on the fire in Grenfell Tower, they're supposed</b></p> <p>13 <b>to do some job as they made to do. Nothing different.</b></p> <p>2 Q. How often would you hear these noises?</p> <p>3 <b>A. Not so often. I can't say how many times I come across</b></p> <p>4 <b>at the time when they were on, but I'm sure that I've</b></p> <p>5 <b>heard them, but obviously they just work when they don't</b></p> <p>6 <b>need to work.</b></p> <p>7 Q. Were there particular times in the day when you would</p> <p>8 hear the noises?</p> <p>9 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>10 Q. So would you hear them when you left in the morning to</p> <p>11 go to work or when you came back at night?</p> <p>12 <b>A. I haven't heard on that day or on the night of the fire.</b></p> <p>13 Q. Did you ever hear the noise on a hot day?</p> <p>14 <b>A. I don't remember was it on the hot day specifically, or</b></p> <p>15 <b>some other time, but I've heard them a few times. Were there ever times when you found the temperature on</p> <p>5 the landings to be uncomfortable?</p> <p>6 <b>A. Maybe during the summertime, during the very hot days,</b></p> <p>7 <b>which is a normal thing, to get a bit hotter and warmer</b></p> <p>8 <b>than usual, but nothing really unusual.</b></p> <p>9 Q. But on those days, did you ever hear the sound of</p> <p>10 fans --</p> <p>11 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>12 Q. -- when you were on the landing?</p> <p>13 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>14 Q. Did you ever feel the movement of air?</p> <p>15 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>16 Q. Before we leave that photograph, you can see on the</p> <p>17 left-hand side of the picture there's what looks like</p> <p>18 a cupboard opposite the lifts. Do you see that? It's</p> <p>19 got a blue sign on it.</p> <p>20 <b>A. Yes, I can see that.</b></p> <p>21 Q. In your statement -- we'll come to it in due course --</p> <p>22 you refer to a storage cupboard. Is that what you were</p> <p>23 referring to?</p> <p>24 <b>A. This is the cupboard which was covering the gas pipes</b></p> <p>25 <b>and some other installations.</b></p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 85</p>	<p>1 work, for example, you would just -- was it fairly easy</p> <p>2 to pull it shut?</p> <p>3 <b>A. No, it was always the case, like every time if I open</b></p> <p>4 <b>the door, I have to close them. So they're not going to</b></p> <p>5 <b>close itself.</b></p> <p>6 Q. Did your door have a letterbox in it?</p> <p>7 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>8 Q. I want now to start asking you some questions about</p> <p>9 13 and 14 June.</p> <p>10 Can I take you to page 6 of your statement, please.</p> <p>11 Let's expand paragraphs 24 to 26.</p> <p>12 You begin, Mr Lukic, on 13 June. You say you had</p> <p>13 a relatively normal day before going to bed on that</p> <p>14 night. You'd been at work all day. You came home. You</p> <p>15 were tired as you had done a lot of driving that day.</p> <p>16 When you went to sleep that night, your flatmate, Miran,</p> <p>17 hadn't come back yet, had he? Were they always on on your landing, even</p> <p>7 late at night?</p> <p>8 <b>A. Yes. Most of the time, yes.</b></p> <p>9 Q. Let's go back to your statement, please, and page 5.</p> <p>10 Just expand paragraph 18, please.</p> <p>11 This is the part of your statement where you deal</p> <p>12 with the door to your flat.</p> <p>13 You say:</p> <p>14 "18. I asked him if he had been</p> <p>2 smoking, which he denied. He said that he didn't know</p> <p>3 what was going on."</p> <p>4 When you say fire alarm in that paragraph, do you</p> <p>5 mean smoke alarm?</p> <p>6 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>7 Q. Where was that smoke alarm located? You've said it's</p> <p>8 one in your kitchen.</p> <p>9 <b>A. It was in the kitchen, yes.</b></p> <p>10 Q. Did you have a smoke alarm anywhere else in the flat?</p> <p>11 <b>A. It may be in the hallway but, to be honest, I don't</b></p> <p>12 <b>really remember.</b></p> <p>13 Q. The one that's clear in your mind is the one in the</p> <p>14 kitchen?</p> <p>15 <b>A. That's the one I remember very well, because I used to</b></p> <p>16 <b>reset that alarm a few times on the night of the fire.</b></p> <p>17 Q. You mentioned there that it was an alarm that could be</p> <p>18 triggered by cigarette smoke. Had that happened before?</p> <p>19 <b>A. Not really, but obviously it was a kind of sensitive</b></p> <p>20 <b>alarm. Not to be triggered by the cigarette, but maybe</b></p> <p>21 <b>if you're cooking something, if you're burning food,</b></p> <p>22 <b>that could go off.</b></p> <p>23 Q. And that had happened before in the past, had it?</p> <p>24 <b>A. It did.</b></p> <p>25 Q. So if we look at paragraph 26, what you explain there is</p> <p style="text-align: right;">Page 88</p>

<p>1 that you then got up and you walked to the kitchen.</p> <p>2 Let's look, please, at your plan of the layout of</p> <p>3 the flat, and that's at IWS00000770, page 20, please.</p> <p>4 I think if we just orientate ourselves, number 1 on</p> <p>5 that plan was your bedroom; is that right?</p> <p>6 <b>A. It is, yes.</b></p> <p>7 Q. Then 3 is the kitchen, and Miran was using the living</p> <p>8 room, number 4, as his bedroom.</p> <p>9 <b>A. That's correct.</b></p> <p>10 Q. So to get from your bedroom, you would have to walk out</p> <p>11 into the hallway and then in through the door into the</p> <p>12 kitchen; is that right?</p> <p>13 <b>A. Not really into the kitchen. It looks like there's two doors in the hallway: one that</p> <p>22 leads to your bedroom, marked 1, and one that opens into</p> <p>23 the kitchen. Was that another route into the kitchen?</p> <p>24 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>25 Q. Even when I've got into the kitchen,</b></p> <p>17 <b>I could smell some sort of strange smell, like when the</b></p> <p>18 <b>electricity burning, like when the plastic is burning,</b></p> <p>19 <b>and at that point I was thinking it could be some of the</b></p> <p>20 <b>wires in the walls of the installation. I tried to</b></p> <p>21 <b>touch the wall around the cooker. I assumed that could</b></p> <p>22 <b>be a problem because that's a three-phase cooker, and</b></p> <p>23 <b>one of the phases could be burning, but I couldn't find</b></p> <p>24 <b>at that time nothing strange. The wall was just normal,</b></p> <p>25 <b>nothing hot at all.</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 91</p>
<p>1 pointed out: you could go from the hallway through that</p> <p>2 door, you could go through the living room --</p> <p>3 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>4 Q. -- and if you were already in the living room, then</p> <p>5 where there is that cross, you could just walk through</p> <p>6 that open space; is that right?</p> <p>7 <b>A. It is, yes, you can walk in between living room and</b></p> <p>8 <b>kitchen, there is no doors. It's an open space.</b></p> <p>9 Q. When you woke up and when Miran came to see you, before</p> <p>10 you left your bedroom, were you aware of any smoke in</p> <p>11 your bedroom?</p> <p>12 <b>A. When I got to the kitchen, the small alarm as</b></p> <p>13 <b>I mentioned as a fire alarm, but actually that's the</b></p> <p>14 <b>smoke alarm, it was on already, and what crossed my mind</b></p> <p>15 <b>at that time, as I also mentioned, I was thinking he was</b></p> <p>16 <b>smoking. He was kind of pretending he doesn't smoke,</b></p> <p>17 <b>but I was also pretending that I don't know about that!</b></p> <p>18 <b>I know, but that's what happened.</b></p> <p>19 <b>And because he is quite new in the apartment, and he</b></p> <p>20 <b>was afraid and scared what's happening, because even if</b></p> <p>21 <b>he was smoking before, the fire alarm never got off</b></p> <p>22 <b>because of the cigarette, because of the smoke of the</b></p> <p>23 <b>cigarette.</b></p> <p>24 <b>At that time, I didn't know really what's going on.</b></p> <p>25 <b>I re-set alarm a few times, but every couple of seconds</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 90</p>	<p>1 Q. The wall didn't feel hot to your touch?</p> <p>2 <b>A. No, no.</b></p> <p>3 Q. The cooker didn't feel hot to your touch at all?</p> <p>4 <b>A. No, no. I noticed the tiny, tiny layer of the smoke</b></p> <p>5 <b>above, but I didn't know where that is coming from.</b></p> <p>6 <b>I haven't had a clue at that time.</b></p> <p>7 Q. Well, let's just take you back to what you say in your</p> <p>8 statement, please. If we look at page 6 of the</p> <p>9 statement and paragraph 26.</p> <p>10 I won't read it all out, Mr Lukic, because you've</p> <p>11 explained some of what you did when you went to the</p> <p>12 kitchen already, so I will just pick up some parts of</p> <p>13 this that I want to ask you about.</p> <p>14 So you've gone to the kitchen. Do you remember</p> <p>15 whether Miran came with you?</p> <p>16 <b>A. He was with me. He was in the kitchen, actually, trying</b></p> <p>17 <b>to find out, same as myself, what was going on.</b></p> <p>18 Q. What you've described there is you realised that --</p> <p>19 you've turned off the fire alarm, but you say:</p> <p>20 "I turned around and realised that there was some</p> <p>21 smoke in the flat -- not a lot, but enough to make the</p> <p>22 fire alarm go off again a minute or two after we had</p> <p>23 turned it off. It was a very thin cloud of light grey</p> <p>24 smoke -- it looked like cigarette smoke ... It was all</p> <p>25 floating around the top of the room just below the</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 92</p>

1 ceiling. I could smell the smoke but only just."  
 2 Just so that we can be clear, which room are you  
 3 referring to here?  
 4 **A. That was in the kitchen.**  
 5 Q. So when you went to the kitchen, you couldn't find  
 6 anything wrong. Nothing felt hot. But what you did  
 7 notice was light grey smoke floating at the top, just  
 8 below the ceiling; is that right?  
 9 **A. It is, yes. And at that time, I didn't know where is**  
 10 **that coming from. Even at that point, I was still**  
 11 **thinking that that's the cigarette smoke, but**  
 12 **unfortunately I was wrong.**  
 13 Q. Did it smell like cigarette smoke in the kitchen?  
 14 **A. No.**  
 15 Q. Was the smell more, like you said, an electric burning  
 16 smell?  
 17 **A. Yes.**  
 18 Q. Was it a very strong smell?  
 19 **A. Not really. But, again, not to be unnoticed, so that**  
 20 **was my viewing in regards of that.**  
 21 Q. You mention, I think, you also opened the kitchen  
 22 window; is that right?  
 23 **A. Yes.**  
 24 Q. Did you leave the kitchen window open?  
 25 **A. I did, yes. I think it was slightly open already, but**

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1 **I just tried to open it fully, as much as it was**  
 2 **possible to open.**  
 3 Q. So even before, that night, it had been left slightly  
 4 open, had it?  
 5 **A. It was a hot night, yes.**  
 6 Q. You mention in this paragraph that we can see that you  
 7 had looked out of the window and seen people outside,  
 8 and you've obviously gone to open the window a little  
 9 more.  
 10 Was there anything else that you could see from the  
 11 kitchen window at this time?  
 12 **A. I was able to see people down on the ground level. It**  
 13 **was a time of the Ramadan, and I know people are going**  
 14 **to pray and breaking fast around that time, and my first**  
 15 **thought was that people are just coming back home from**  
 16 **the mosque or just, like, from the night out. I didn't**  
 17 **know at that point what was going on.**  
 18 Q. But looking out of the window, you didn't pick up on any  
 19 signs of smoke outside or signs of fire at all, did you?  
 20 **A. Not from the outside. It was a bit louder than usually,**  
 21 **but at that point I didn't think there is a fire on --**  
 22 **maybe I didn't pay enough attention, what was going on.**  
 23 Q. Can we look, then, at paragraph 28, please.  
 24 You begin that paragraph by saying:  
 25 "28. Miran had walked out of the kitchen by this

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1 point, I am not sure when — around 5 or 10 minutes after  
 2 we first turned the fire alarm off (so around  
 3 1.10-1.15am)."  
 4 By then, what has happened is you've woken up, Miran  
 5 and yourself have gone to the kitchen. By then, how  
 6 many times do you think you'd had to turn the fire alarm  
 7 off?  
 8 **A. Three, four times. Even at some point it wasn't even**  
 9 **possible to turn it off, because it kept going all the**  
 10 **time, so ...**  
 11 Q. Had there been any change in the conditions in the  
 12 kitchen?  
 13 **A. Well, I mean, like, once you try to turn it off again**  
 14 **and again and it goes off, I mean, something is**  
 15 **happening, but I didn't know what was going on.**  
 16 MR RAWAT: Thank you.  
 17 Mr Chairman, I'm just going to move on to another  
 18 topic shortly, so I wonder whether we could have a short  
 19 5-minute break.  
 20 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: You'd like a break?  
 21 MR RAWAT: Yes, please.  
 22 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Mr Lukic, we have breaks in the  
 23 evidence from time to time for all sorts of reasons. As  
 24 you heard, Mr Rawat would like a break now. So we're  
 25 going to stop for a short time, let's say 10 minutes.

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1 I have to ask you not to talk to anyone about your  
 2 evidence while you're out of the room, and if you go  
 3 with the usher, we'll resume at 2.40. All right?  
 4 THE WITNESS: Okay.  
 5 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Would you like to go with the usher  
 6 now.  
 7 THE WITNESS: Thank you.  
 8 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Right, 2.40, please.  
 9 (2.30 pm)  
 10 (A short break)  
 11 (2.40 pm)  
 12 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: All right, Mr Lukic? Ready to carry  
 13 on?  
 14 THE WITNESS: Yes.  
 15 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Mr Rawat.  
 16 MR RAWAT: Thank you, Mr Chairman. Could we go back,  
 17 please, to page 7 and paragraph 28.  
 18 Mr Lukic, if I pick it up from Miran opening the  
 19 front door to the flat, what you say is:  
 20 "The whole flat seemed to fill up with incredibly  
 21 thick, black, acrid smoke within seconds. It felt like  
 22 there was a draught coming through which sucked all of  
 23 the dark smoke into the flat. It was billowing through  
 24 the door into the whole of the flat — floor to ceiling -  
 25 but it was not so thick that I could not see anything.

The smoke was</p> <p>2 horrible and smelled very strong — I was coughing a</p> <p>3 lot."</p> <p>4 The smoke was obviously very different from that</p> <p>5 which you had first noticed in the kitchen, wasn't it?</p> <p>6 <b>A. It was very different.</b></p> <p>7 Q. Before Miran opened the door, had any of this black</p> <p>8 smoke come into the flat at all?</p> <p>9 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>10 Q. I understand.</p> <p>3 Miran had opened the door. You moved to close it.</p> <p>4 In doing that and shutting the door, were you able to</p> <p>5 see anything of what was happening in the landing area?</p> <p>6 <b>A. No. Do you mean in the communal area?</b></p> <p>7 Q. In the communal area.</p> <p>8 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>9 Q. Did you have any sense whether the lights in the</p> <p>10 communal area were still on or not?</p> <p>11 <b>A. No, not at that point.</b></p> <p>12 Q. So is that no, they weren't on, or no, you didn't see?</p> <p>13 <b>A. I didn't see. Obviously it was even worse than in the</b></p> <p>14 <b>flat, but I didn't see at that point. I can't remember what time it was but</p> <p>8 I remember looking at my watch around this time and</p> <p>9 seeing that it was before 1.30am. It was smoky, but grey smoke, it</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 106</p>	<p>1 the chute where you really have to put the rubbish in,</p> <p>2 it's connected down to the ground directly. It could be</p> <p>3 draught from the outside area, from the lower floors,</p> <p>4 but anyway it was way better than the communal area.</p> <p>5 It was smoky, but not that much, like the communal.</p> <p>6 Q. How long did you spend in that rubbish chute room?</p> <p>7 A. I don't know, it took me -- I don't know ... maybe</p> <p>8 a minute until I realise what was happening, then</p> <p>9 I realise that Miran got back, friend of mine got back</p> <p>10 to the flat, and I had to go back to the flat to take</p> <p>11 him again.</p> <p>12 So, I don't know, let's say up to a minute, maybe.</p> <p>13 Just enough to get another breath, to realise where I am</p> <p>14 and what should I do next.</p> <p>15 Q. As you tell us in your statement, what you did next was</p> <p>16 you managed to make your way back to flat 84, didn't</p> <p>17 you?</p> <p>18 A. Yes, I did, because my front door, it's on the opposite</p> <p>19 side of the rubbish compartment, of the chute. So even</p> <p>20 by touching the wall, it will take me to my flat. It was probably, I don't know, maybe third or fourth</b></p> <p>10 <b>time, but then I realise something serious is happening.</b></p> <p>11 <b>So even experiencing that communal area, with that much</b></p> <p>12 <b>smoke, and then even seeing more people outside, at that</b></p> <p>13 <b>point, I realise something's happening, something</b></p> <p>14 <b>serious is happening.</b></p> <p>15 Q. What you couldn't see from that kitchen window at this</p> <p>16 point, even after having come back from the communal</p> <p>17 hallway – there was no sign of fire or smoke outside,</p> <p>18 was there?</p> <p>19 <b>A. I couldn't see at that point, no, because my flat is in</b></p> <p>20 <b>the middle of the building and I can see nothing what's</b></p> <p>21 <b>happening on the side. I can see only down towards the</b></p> <p>22 <b>west side and down under, of course, what was happening</b></p> <p>23 <b>down on the ground floor. I mean outside ground.</b></p> <p>24 Q. If we go, then, to paragraph 34, please, page 10.</p> <p>25 Again, I won't read it all out, but what then</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 109</p>	<p>1 <b>A. We were next to the window.</b></p> <p>2 Q. Was that the window in the kitchen?</p> <p>3 <b>A. Window in the kitchen and window in the living room are</b></p> <p>4 <b>not far away from each other, so we probably tried to</b></p> <p>5 <b>find out each of the windows, what's going on, in order</b></p> <p>6 <b>to get more informations.</b></p> <p>7 <b>People down on the ground, they already have been</b></p> <p>8 <b>shouting on us in the building to get out of the</b></p> <p>9 <b>building, there is a fire on, but I couldn't see. Fire</b></p> <p>10 <b>was behind me. At that point, I didn't know how big and</b></p> <p>11 <b>serious fire was.</b></p> <p>12 Q. Could we look, please, at paragraphs 35 and 36.</p> <p>13 You deal in these paragraphs with the preparations</p> <p>14 that you made to get out. When you got to the stairwell -- we see that in</p> <p>3 paragraph 38, you say "When we arrived in the</p> <p>4 stairwell" -- do you remember if the door to the</p> <p>5 stairwell was open or closed when you got to it?</p> <p>6 A. I think I had to push them to open.</p> <p>7 Q. If we just look at paragraph 38. What you say about the</p> <p>8 stairwell is:</p> <p>9 "... I remember being relieved, as the smoke in</p> <p>10 there was less thick, less black. There was smoke</p> <p>11 everywhere, but it was a bit thinner -- you could see</p> <p>12 more through it and it was more grey than it was black.</p> <p>13 I don't know why it was less smoky in the stairway, but</p> <p>14 I do remember in the hall there were the big industrial</p> <p>15 vents in there that used to be really noisy. But you weren't able to see whether there was smoke</p> <p>24 coming through those vents on that night, were you?</p> <p>25 A. No, it was too smoky. I think it does.</b></p> <p>6 Q. Do you remember whether it closed on that night?</p> <p>7 <b>A. It probably did, but I don't remember. I didn't look</b></p> <p>8 <b>back.</b></p> <p>9 Q. Do you have any recollection of either yourself or Miran</p> <p>10 pushing the door shut?</p> <p>11 <b>A. Not really.</b></p> <p>12 Q. Just the final matter, please, Mr Lukic.</p> <p>13 We've all read your written statement. That's going</p> <p>14 to be published now. It is, yes.</b></p> <p>8 Q. There looks to be like a grille with a white edging at</p> <p>9 the top of the image, and one in the same position but</p> <p>10 at the bottom of the image. On the night of the fire, when you were in the bin chute</p> <p>20 room, were you aware of any air coming into it at all?</p> <p>21 <b>A. Not really. All I was aware about the chute, there was</b></p> <p>22 <b>less smoke than the communal area, and that probably</b></p> <p>23 <b>even helped me to be where I am today.</b></p> <p>24 Q. The reference is at IWS00000169.</p> <p>13 If we go to page 30 of that document, we see that</p> <p>14 the statement is dated 15 May 2018, signed by Mr Daffarn</p> <p>15 with a statement of truth.</p> <p>16 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Yes.</p> <p>17 MR RAWAT: There are 26 exhibits to the statement. They are</p> <p>18 exhibits ED/1 to ED/26, and the references for that are</p> <p>19 IWS00000169, page 31, to IWS00000169, page 127.</p> <p>20 Mr Chairman, again, just to give the evidence that</p> <p>21 we heard this morning some context, I would just like to</p> <p>22 draw your attention to some parts of the statement, but</p> <p>23 of course the approach that was set out last week still</p> <p>24 applies. This is a statement which will be published in</p> <p>25 its entirety and will, in its entirety, stand as</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 129</p>	<p>1 Sometimes I fall asleep before it's over, but on the</p> <p>2 night of the fire I was still awake at the end of the</p> <p>3 programme, I feel it must have been about 01:10am</p> <p>4 (Wednesday 14th June 2017) when I heard the 'beep beep'</p> <p>5 of my neighbour Joe's smoke alarm. I have heard it go</p> <p>6 off before. I didn't stir from my bed as I assumed Joe</p> <p>7 had burnt some toast or something. I do have a smoke</p> <p>8 alarm in my hall which was installed by the London Fire</p> <p>9 Brigade maybe four or five years ago but I didn't hear</p> <p>10 my alarm, and to the best of my knowledge it was Joe's</p> <p>11 alarm that I heard. I don't know when the fire alarms</p> <p>12 in my flat were last tested, that's not to say that they</p> <p>13 weren't, it's just that I can't remember if or when it</p> <p>14 might have happened.</p> <p>15 "10. I then heard someone, I don't know who,</p> <p>16 shouting. With that I got out of my bed, put on some</p> <p>17 pink shorts and went to have a look at what was going on</p> <p>18 outside. <p>1 evidence before the inquiry.</p> <p>2 But, again, just to start with a short summary,</p> <p>3 Mr Daffarn lived in Grenfell Tower for 16 years. He was</p> <p>4 actively involved with the Grenfell Tower Residents'</p> <p>5 Association, and he has made a statement to the inquiry</p> <p>6 about his experiences of the early hours of 14 June.</p> <p>7 If I take you, Mr Chairman, just to paragraph 9,</p> <p>8 please, and pick it up from there.</p> <p>9 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Yes.</p> <p>10 MR RAWAT: In his statement, Mr Daffarn explains that he was</p> <p>11 woken up on the night at around 01.10 am by the sound of</p> <p>12 a smoke alarm from the home of Joe and Samuel Daniels.</p> <p>13 He lived next door to the Daniels; they were in</p> <p>14 flat 135, he was in 134. As we all know, we heard</p> <p>15 evidence from Samuel Daniels this morning.</p> <p>16 Mr Daffarn also says that he received a call from</p> <p>17 a fellow resident, William Thompson, warning him of the</p> <p>18 fire a few minutes after he woke.</p> <p>19 If I pick it up from paragraph 9 and read some of</p> <p>20 that into the record, please:</p> <p>21 "9. On the night of the fire I was alone in my</p> <p>22 flat. I went to bed to listen to the radio. I've</p> <p>23 started listening to a radio programme on Radio London,</p> <p>24 Duncan Barks. It's every night from Sunday to</p> <p>25 Thursday. I know it finishes at 01:00am in the morning.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 130</p>	<p>1 hallway outside my flat was full of black and white</p> <p>2 smoke all mixed together. My initial instinct was to</p> <p>3 stay in my flat. There had been a sign by the side of</p> <p>4 the lift which gave fire safety advice which said to</p> <p>5 remain in your flat. I'm not sure if that was in the</p> <p>6 back of my mind or not. However, I didn't have time to</p> <p>7 contemplate what I should do next because my mobile</p> <p>8 phone started to ring. It was Willie Thompson. Willie</p> <p>9 told me to get out of my flat and by the power and</p> <p>10 strength of his voice, I knew not to argue with him and</p> <p>11 to just leave.</p> <p>12 "11. I immediately went to my bathroom and dampened</p> <p>13 a lime green towel with water. I went to the front door</p> <p>14 and then out of habit I picked up my keys and my mobile</p> <p>15 phone on my way out of the flat. I later realised that</p> <p>16 my oyster card and a bank card were in the pocket of the</p> <p>17 pink shorts I had put on. I don't remember seeing any</p> <p>18 smoke coming into my flat through the letterbox or</p> <p>19 around the door.</p> <p>20 "12. I opened the door of my flat, stepped outside</p> <p>21 and shut the door behind me. I also wrapped the towel</p> <p>22 around my mouth and nose, holding the towel with one</p> <p>23 hand behind my head. I both shut my door and wrapped</p> <p>24 the towel around my mouth and nose because that's what</p> <p>25 you are told to do in the event of a fire. <p>1 was so thick I couldn't see beyond the end of my nose.  2 The smoke was aggressive and bellowing against me.  3 I couldn't feel any heat. I don't remember seeing any  4 flames. The smoke seemed to be moving but I find it  5 difficult to describe how. I held my other hand out in  6 front of me trying to find the emergency exit stairs but  7 I couldn't find them. I couldn't see anything. If  8 there were any lights on in the hall, the smoke was  9 completely blocking any light. I have been shown some  10 'Fire and smoke descriptors' provided to me by the  11 Inquiry and I would definitely describe the smoke  12 I encountered as image 'E'.  13 "13. I was now in sheer panic. I started to use  14 both hands to try and find the way out, I was running my  15 hands along the wall but not finding the door. I don't  16 recall dropping the towel away from my face but I think  17 I may have done in my panic to find the way out. I  18 started to inhale the smoke. I thought to myself 'shit  19 man, this isn't going to end well for me'. I thought  20 I was about to die. Just then I felt someone tapping on  21 the right side of my leg, I looked down and that's when  22 I realised that the smoke was much thinner on the floor.  23 I could see a fire fighter, lying on the floor. He was  24 lying face down across the threshold of the doorway with  25 his legs out in the stairwell. I could now see the</p> <p>Page 133</p>	<p>1 Flat 64 on my way down. He uses two crutches. I should  2 have stopped for him, but I was just so scared and was  3 not able to stop running. I know he made it out ok  4 because I have seen him since at the mosque. I don't  5 even remember running down the stairs in the main  6 reception area. That part is completely gone from my  7 memory. All I can say is I ran for my life."  8 Mr Chairman, I'm going to stop reading that  9 statement at that point.  10 CLARITA GHAVIMI (evidence read into the record)  11 MR RAWAT: If I can go to the second statement, and again,  12 the same point applies. That statement in its entirety  13 goes into the record. It is the statement of  14 Clarita Ghavimi, IWS00000943.  15 If we go to page 8 of that statement, you see the  16 statement is dated 28 June 2018. It's signed and  17 carries a statement of truth.  18 There are no exhibits to the statement.  19 Ms Ghavimi had lived in the tower since 1983. She  20 originally lived with her family in the two-bed flat,  21 but had lived in the property alone for three years  22 prior to the fire, and that property was flat 75 on  23 floor 10.  24 She was alone on the night of 13 June 2017.  25 If I could pick it up, please, at paragraph 7, which</p> <p>Page 135</p>
<p>1 stairs. I ran for my life down the stairs. I think  2 I was in the hallway outside my flat for less than  3 fifteen seconds, probably more like five seconds.  4 I don't think I would have survived for fifteen seconds.  5 During the building works last year they had boxed off  6 some pipes. I think I was feeling around that boxed off  7 bit when the fireman touched me. I feel like that  8 boxing-in could have killed me because I was pawing at  9 it, trying desperately to find the fire exit when the  10 fireman grabbed me; the boxing-in impeded my direct line  11 of escape to the stairwell. I thought the boxing-in was  12 the fire escape door and given how dark it was and in a  13 panic I couldn't work out why it wasn't opening. I feel  14 the firemen must have saved me as I was taking my last  15 breaths. I think he was lying on the floor when he  16 grabbed me.  17 "14. My memory of getting down the stairs is  18 patchy. I know I could see so it wasn't completely  19 dark."  20 I am going to skip a little bit and finish with the  21 last part of that paragraph:  22 "I ran past my next door neighbour Sam on the  23 stairs. I know I passed several fire-fighters a couple  24 of floors down. I also remember passing my disabled  25 neighbour whose name I now know is Maher Khoudair from</p> <p>Page 134</p>	<p>1 is at page 2.  2 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Yes.  3 MR RAWAT: "7. On Tuesday, 13 June 2017 I was at home on my  4 own. I tend to watch television in the evenings. I was  5 sitting in my lounge and looked through the TV channels  6 but there was nothing on that night that really caught  7 my interest, so I decided to go to bed. I remember it  8 was 11 o'clock when I went to bed that night. I have a  9 clock on the bedroom wall which I looked at as I was  10 going to bed and I recall that it said that it was  11 11 o'clock. I was tired that night. I would normally  12 go to bed later, typically in the early hours around  13 1 o'clock in the morning. This was therefore unusual  14 for me. I recall that I closed my bedroom door and the  15 window in my bedroom was also closed when I went to bed.  16 I fell asleep. I woke up suddenly because I heard my  17 smoke alarm. This smoke alarm is in the hallway.  18 I recall the noise of the smoke alarm waking me up.  19 There was no smell of smoke or any visible smoke in my  20 bedroom.  21 "8. I got out of bed and opened my bedroom door.  22 The alarm was still making a noise and there was a  23 slight smell of smoke. I could not see any smoke but  24 I could smell it. I went back to my bedroom and put the  25 light on and got dressed in leggings and a T-shirt.</p> <p>Page 136</p>

<p>1 I also put on my glasses. I came out of my bedroom and  2 went into the lounge. I started to open windows in the  3 lounge to get rid of the smell of smoke. At this point  4 I started to feel panicky. This was approximately  5 1:30 AM in the morning as I had looked at the clock in  6 the bedroom just before this and saw that it was 1:30.  7 I continued to walk around the flat, opening more  8 windows in the lounge and kitchen. From my lounge and  9 kitchen windows, when I look out of them my view is the  10 rear of Grenfell Tower where the playground and school  11 are located. As I looked out of the windows I could see  12 lots of people outside and there seemed to be a lot of  13 noise. I do not recall seeing any firefighters or  14 police at this stage but as my view is the rear of the  15 Tower this may explain why. I believe most of them  16 would have been at the front of the tower.  17 "9. I remember looking out of my bedroom window  18 where I could see the flames coming up the corner of the  19 Tower. The flame seemed to have moved diagonally across  20 the Tower and then upwards. I went to my front door to  21 open it. When I opened the door I saw that the communal  22 area outside my flat was pitch black and smoky. There  23 was no one else there. I closed the front door as  24 I felt that I would not be able to get out in those  25 conditions. I did not call the emergency services.</p> <p>Page 137</p>	<p>1 back to my front door with the wet tea towel to try and  2 get out.  3 "12. As I walked this time through my hallway to  4 the front door of my flat I picked up my jacket before  5 getting to the front door. I was feeling frightened and  6 I was worried about the smoke. I thought about going  7 into my bedroom to collect my passport and my purse but  8 I decided not to waste time and to get out as soon as  9 I could. I had the wet tea towel with me. I started to  10 see what I would describe as light smoke in my hallway  11 and coming from my lounge area. At this point I recall  12 thinking that I had made a mistake and should not have  13 opened the windows. The alarm was still sounding in my  14 hallway. I was thinking how I needed to get out of my  15 flat immediately.  16 "13. I made my way to the front door and opened the  17 front door. I had put the wet tea towel over my mouth  18 to try and help me breathe. I had one hand holding the  19 tea towel in place and I was using my other hand to feel  20 my way to the door that leads to the stairwell. I would  21 describe the conditions in the communal landing outside  22 my flat as pitch black. I could see nothing at all.  23 However as I had lived in the building for so long  24 I knew where had to go from my front door to get to the  25 fire exit that lead to the stairs. Therefore I was able</p> <p>Page 139</p>
<p>1 Instead I opened more windows in the flat. I could hear  2 people shouting from below 'Get out, get out, go to the  3 fire exit'. I also heard people shouting 'Get out. The  4 building is going to collapse'.  5 "10. I decided to ring my son Dariush. He lives  6 locally in with his wife and children. I rang Dariush  7 on his mobile phone. It went to voicemail. I then  8 thought that he was probably asleep because of the time.  9 I think I left a message on his voicemail but am not  10 certain. I cannot really recall what I said.  11 "11. I think that Dariush rang me back shortly  12 afterwards. I cannot say with any certainty whether or  13 not I spoke with him. Around this time I decided to go  14 to the front of my flat again to see if I could get out.  15 I opened the door and the conditions in the communal  16 hallway had got worse. It was thick with smoke.  17 I closed the door quickly and went back to the kitchen  18 and looked out the window. I knew my only way out of  19 the Tower was through my front door. I went into the  20 kitchen and I recall seeing a tea towel hanging up in  21 front of me. I put water from the tap on this tea towel  22 as I thought I could wet it and then use it to help me  23 get through the smoke. In order to wet the tea towel,  24 I put down my mobile phone and I never picked it up  25 again. It was left in my kitchen as I immediately went</p> <p>Page 138</p>	<p>1 to feel my way through the communal landing to get to  2 that door. I think I left my front door open and it  3 does not close by itself. I think the self-closing was  4 broken and never got round to getting it fixed. I also  5 could not hear anyone else. There was no noise in the  6 communal landing as far as I recall. I also do not  7 recall the communal landing being hot. But there was  8 thick smoke and I can recall the smell of the smoke.  9 I would describe it as a bad smell and I felt my throat  10 was suffocating as I was trying to escape. It was very  11 challenging to get through and very disorientating. It  12 was very scary and it was very difficult to find my way  13 to the stairwell. By this point I was very distressed.  14 Managed to feel my way to the fire exit door to the  15 stairwell which is to the left of my flat door. The  16 fire exit doors were closed. I think it closes  17 automatically. The door is very heavy and I was  18 struggling to open it with just one hand, as the other  19 hand was holding the tea towel over my mouth.  20 "14. As I pulled the fire door open I could see the  21 stairwell. I could see the conditions were different  22 from the communal landing area that I had been  23 struggling to get through. The electric lights were on.  24 There was a little smoke but not like before. There was  25 no heat in the stairwell. I recall seeing two adult</p> <p>Page 140</p>

<p>1 males coming down the stairs just as I was opening the</p> <p>2 door. I would describe them as big, tall men. The</p> <p>3 stairs were not busy and do not recall seeing any other</p> <p>4 residents I thought everyone else must have got out</p> <p>5 already. The two men that I had seen coming down were</p> <p>6 not people that I was personally familiar with.</p> <p>7 "15. One of the men walked up to me and picked me</p> <p>8 up and placed me over his shoulder. He did this before</p> <p>9 I had said a word to him, although I was clearly in a</p> <p>10 distressed state, As he carried me I was face down and</p> <p>11 I do not know how my glasses did not come off. Recall</p> <p>12 him saying 'don't worry, we have got you'. That was the</p> <p>13 first thing he said to me. He also said 'It's okay'</p> <p>14 several times to reassure me as we went down the stairs.</p> <p>15 As we went down the stairs I closed my eyes I kept my</p> <p>16 eyes shut most of the way down and would only open them</p> <p>17 occasionally. I recall at one point that we stopped and</p> <p>18 he put me down for a moment before picking me up again</p> <p>19 and carrying me down the rest of the way. I recall</p> <p>20 opening my eyes briefly at another point, I think near</p> <p>21 the bottom of the stairs, and seeing firefighters who</p> <p>22 were on their way up the stairs. I do not know what</p> <p>23 time or what floor we were on at the time. On another</p> <p>24 occasion when I opened my eyes, I recall seeing a hose</p> <p>25 lying flat on the floor.
