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She started shouting over the phone telling me to leave. Because of what I'd been told by the 999 people, I just thought, 'Calm down'. I woke the children and then made a cup of coffee in my Starbucks cup and had a cigarette out the window. So I was pretty relaxed. I could hear the police and firemen outside and so I knew they were there and believed it was just a case of waiting for them to get me.

"26. My recollection is that I called 999 again a

few times, because the fire-fighters didn't come. I can't recall the details of the number of calls or what was said. Again I want to rely on the recordings of these calls rather than my memory, for the reasons I've already given. My recollection is that in one of these calls, the operator advised me to leave the flat if I could. I know that we went to the front door to see what it would be like if we tried to get out without the firemen and I think I did this because we were told to try and get out, but I can't be sure about that. Anyway, we definitely did this, but I can't remember the time. The whole hallway was covered in thick smoke, top to bottom. It was white. It didn't have a smell. It was not so thick I could not see my kids, but it stung our eyes and it was thick enough that I couldn't see anything further away from me, like the doors or the

"31. My elder son [redacted] says that at one point a firefighter was squirting water on a ladder right outside the kitchen window and that he opened the window and asked for help. He says the fireman said 'Close your windows, block the windows and stay there'. I don't know what time this was.

"32. Some time around 3, I could hear my son [redacted] on the phone to the 999 people asking for help and crying. A short time later, I noticed black smoke coming through the children's bedroom window. It was coming under the door too. We were struggling to breathe by now. I began thinking that we are going to have to leave, with or without the firemen. I called 999 again and told them that black smoke is coming into

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walls.

"27. We went towards the stairs. We could not breathe properly, the smoke was stinging our eyes and the kids were crying. I opened the stairs door thinking it might only be in the lobby, but it was worse in the stairway, it was thick with smoke. The lights were off, it was dark, you could see and feel the smoke, in your eyes and when you breathed. It didn't look safe to go down and the kids were crying. So we ran back into the flat. 9	"19. My son Giulio took the first flight out to	9	
10	London from Venice the next day and stayed a couple of	10	
11	days searching for Gloria. He went around all the	11	
12	hospitals looking for her and searching for any	12	
13	information in vain.	13	
14	"20. I don't remember when we were officially	14	
15	notified of Gloria's death. I think it was 2 or 3 days	15	
16	later when we were notified by the Italian Consulate."	16	
17	I conclude just by taking you, Mr Chairman, to the	17	
18	last two paragraphs of the statement on page 6, which is	18	
19	headed "Gloria".	19	
20	Paragraph 25 reads:	20	
21	"25. Gloria's body was brought back to Italy on	21	
22	18th July 2017 and the funeral took place the following	22	
23	day (19th July).	23	
24	"26. My life stopped there. I do not live	24	
25	anymore."	25	
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
