They may be updated, so you</p> <p>12 need to check each day, and I still may tell you other</p> <p>13 things, as I'm about to do now.</p> <p>14 In the first of today's commemorations, it's nothing</p> <p>15 to do with the night, but there is a voice of one of the</p> <p>16 people being commemorated. So if you know that person</p> <p>17 and you're not expecting to hear that voice, their voice</p> <p>18 will be heard.</p> <p>19 The one today that I draw your attention to is the</p> <p>20 very powerful video which has been produced by the</p> <p>21 brother of Ernie Vital and the son of Marjorie, and you</p> <p>22 see there are a number of points there. I'll just</p> <p>23 gently remind you of that. If you don't hear me say it,</p> <p>24 anybody sitting near me, do not feel in any way worried</p> <p>25 about doing that.</p> <p>Page 1</p>	<p>1 feel free to leave the room, but after that's happened</p> <p>2 the room is there as usual for people to use, and of</p> <p>3 course we've always got upstairs.</p> <p>4 As far as the commemorations are concerned today,</p> <p>5 I've given you the trigger warnings. I don't think</p> <p>6 there's anything else that I should specifically bring</p> <p>7 to your attention, but, of course, what I do say and</p> <p>8 remind you of is that they are by their very nature all</p> <p>9 highly emotional and they will have effects. If you</p> <p>10 need to leave, please feel free to do so. All I would</p> <p>11 ask is can we keep unnecessary movement to a minimum</p> <p>12 whilst we're actually having the commemorations, because</p> <p>13 the people who are trying to present will find it</p> <p>14 a little bit difficult.</p> <p>15 But if you need to leave, please do. The</p> <p>16 counsellors are around all over the building. They are</p> <p>17 wearing either NHS bands or very bright green and orange</p> <p>18 scarves, I think they're wearing, and they are often in</p> <p>19 there. They're to be found. If you can't find one,</p> <p>20 just ask an usher or one of the team and we'll get you</p> <p>21 somebody to see.</p> <p>22 All right?</p> <p>23 The press. Can I thank them for their continued</p> <p>24 help and assistance. Please remember our requests.</p> <p>25 Firstly, that any footage which has been prepared has</p> <p>Page 3</p>

 2 And I'm sure that I speak on behalf of everybody

 2 MR ABOUDIHAIJ: Thank you.
 3 Morning, everybody. My name is Nour-eddine
 4 Aboudihaj and I'm a family friend, and also I've been
 5 supporting Sayeda for and throughout her ordeal. Also,
 6 I was her teacher before so I know the family quite
 7 well. And --
 8 MR RICHMOND: Who is on the stage with you today?
 9 MR ABOUDIHAIJ: On the stage with me is Sara and Aiasha and
 10 Sayeda. Sayeda is on the far left.
 11 Sayeda will not be able to speak, so there will be
 12 a film where Aiasha will give the presentation in her
 13 name.
 14 This is a very difficult time for Sayeda and her
 15 family, and I just want to stress that it gives them

 24 extremely brave to have done that video in the way she

1 COMMEMORATION FOR ANTHONY DISSON
 2 MR RICHMOND: We now turn to commemorations for
 3 Anthony Disson from flat 194.
 4 This is going to be in two stages. The first is
 5 a commemoration by his son Lee, and that is going to be
 6 read by Michael Mansfield QC. Lee himself felt unable
 7 to come to be here today.
 8 SIR MARTIN MOORE-BICK: Mr Mansfield.
 9 MR MANSFIELD: Good morning. Good morning, chair.
 10 Just an extra word about Lee. He doesn't live in
 11 London and he suffers from a complaint osteochondroma,
 12 which his father also suffered from on the 22nd floor,
 13 and this is what Lee has written.
 14 "My dad, Tony Disson, was born in North Kensington,
 15 the youngest in a large family. He spent all of his
 16 childhood in Notting Hill, with his mum, dad and his
 17 brothers and sisters Anne, Pat, Roy, Peter, Brian, Terry
 18 and Kenny. They were, and still are, a large and caring
 19 family who, no matter what, were always there for each
 20 other. One by one, they married and had families of
 21 their own, my cousins.
 22 "My mum and dad met each other since 1967 but it
 23 wasn't until 1968 that they started dating. I was born
 24 on 6 February 1970 in Hammersmith Hospital. Back then,
 25 dads were not allowed in the delivery room, but Dad was

<p>1 at the hospital waiting for my arrival. Of course, 2 I was not aware of this at the time, but it has been 3 told to me over the years. 4 "The three of us lived in Cathnor Road, Shepherds 5 Bush. Then in late 1974, we moved to Fulham. 6 I remember us settling in there and being really happy. 7 I was four when my dad asked my mum to marry him. They 8 set a date, but they had to put it on hold as my 9 uncle Roy was seriously ill. Sadly, he did not live to 10 see his brother marry my mum. 11 "The Brunswick Boys Club played a big part in our 12 lives at that time, as it was right on our doorstep. 13 Dad and I became members and he was a coach in every 14 sport going at the Brunswick. I was with him wherever 15 he went. I don't remember ever missing an event that 16 was taking place; there were camping trips and charity 17 activities. It was special dad and son time for us. 18 "He loved football and became a supporter of Fulham 19 Football Club, our local team. Even when I was small, 20 he would take me along to their matches. The two of us 21 even went to Wembley to watch them play West Ham in the 22 FA Cup Final in 1975. 23 "Another big love of my dad's was horses. His 24 brothers kept them and we were always at the stables 25 under the fly-over near Latimer Road. We decided to buy</p> <p>Page 9</p>	<p>1 because a lot of our family and friends had chalets down 2 there too. 3 "One year, some friends invited us to go abroad with 4 them and their family to Gran Canaria. Oh, wow, what 5 fantastic times we had. This started a routine of 6 heading to Gran Canaria for two weeks every summer. We 7 had so many laughs and met loads of people who became 8 our friends. We travelled about the island, going up to 9 the mountains, to the banana plantations, on camel rides 10 and to the sand dunes. Another hobby of Dad's was 11 fishing, which he also taught me to do. 12 "Every weekend and when I was on school holidays, 13 there was always something going on that Dad and I would 14 do together. To me, our life then was perfect. 15 "We were a close-knit family and my uncles, aunts 16 and cousins would visit us all the time and we would go 17 to them. Every time we were all together it was quality 18 time. Dad's mum and dad lived in Frinstead House, a 19 tower block opposite Grenfell Tower. They lived on the 20 13th floor. We would visit them often and my nan would 21 also come to us on a regular basis, as my mum would do 22 her hair for her. 23 "My mum's brother and his wife lived on the same 24 estate as us. My uncle Fred, my mum's brother, was a 25 long distance lorry driver and he had a serious</p> <p>Page 11</p>
<p>1 a horse of our own and my uncle let us use one of his 2 stables. This took up quite a bit of our time, but we 3 both were still active at the Brunswick Club. 4 I remember at least twice receiving a telephone call 5 from the police that our horse had escaped from the 6 stables and was wandering around the green where the new 7 motorway was being built, and we would have to rush out 8 to rescue him. After this, we decided to sell him, but 9 my dad, not wanting to disappoint me, purchased a 10 Shetland pony called Lady. I remember Dad said to me 11 'Just your size, son, for now'. 12 "He had a totters cart made for me with my name on 13 it and, that Easter, he entered me into the horse parade 14 at Regents Park. I cannot begin to tell you how happy 15 I was. My granddad -- my dad's dad -- and I were proud 16 as punch to drive Lady and our cart at the horse parade 17 in 1977. It was a fantastic and memorable day. We 18 spent so many happy hours at the stables together. 19 "Around the same time, my dad and mum had a touring 20 caravan. Most weekends, if nothing was going on at the 21 Brunswick, we would be off to the New Forest, Hastings, 22 or Leysdown on the Isle of Sheppey. Dad and Mum then 23 bought a chalet in Leysdown, so instead of travelling to 24 the caravan we had our own chalet which we would go to 25 every weekend and holiday. It was a home-from-home</p> <p>Page 10</p>	<p>1 accident. As soon as my dad heard, he drove to Wales 2 and brought him to hospital in London, safe and sound. 3 He was there for him every step of the way during his 4 recovery and continued to make sure his wife and 5 children were looked after. For this, he still holds a 6 special place in my cousins' hearts to this day. For 7 Dad, he was just taking care of family, as he was 8 brought up to do. 9 "My mum and dad divorced, but neither one interfered 10 with the relationships I had with the other and they 11 remained amicable. Dad went on to marry Cordelia, and 12 the two of them had three sons together, Harry, Alfie 13 and Charlie. 14 "When I was 16, my wife and I had a baby of our own, 15 Kelly. Yes, we were young, but Dad was now a granddad, 16 and he loved Kelly, as he did all his grandchildren when 17 they were born. When I lived in Fulham with my wife and 18 kids, Dad used to bring the boys over to see us. 19 "Our lives were not always easy or straightforward. 20 At one point, I discovered that Dad was living in a 21 caravan at the stables. He hadn't wanted me to find 22 out. But he went to the council and told them of his 23 predicament and eventually he was given a flat on the 24 22nd floor of Grenfell Tower. 25 "When he moved in, he needed to furnish it from</p> <p>Page 12</p>

<p>1 scratch and his family rallied around and brought him 2 what he needed. My wife and I bought him his bed. He 3 loved his flat and he loved that he was still in the 4 same area he had grown up in, which he knew like the 5 back of his hand. Dad was an active member of the 6 boxing club and his life was getting back on track. His 7 boys, my half-brothers, loved boxing and Dad was backing 8 them all the way. 9 "In 2009, I moved to Peterborough with my wife and 10 children. That meant we couldn't see each other as 11 often as we used to, but Dad came to visit with Charlie 12 when he had a boxing match locally and I went down to 13 visit him at his flat, as did my daughter Sky, so that 14 Dad could meet his great-granddaughter when she was 15 born. 16 "For reasons I will never fully know, over time, 17 mine and Dad's relationship changed. I would see him at 18 family gatherings and, although we would get along and 19 there was never any awkwardness, things felt different. 20 I tried to contact him on numerous occasions but 21 wouldn't hear back. 22 "I always assumed that we would one day work through 23 whatever it was and that it would be how it used to be. 24 I never once thought that we would not get the chance to 25 make it right.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 13</p>	<p>1 "From an early age, time spent with Dad felt 2 magical. You never knew what was coming next. There 3 were constant surprises and spur of the moment 4 activities which, no matter how small, were always fun. 5 I always looked up to him and we had such a special bond 6 because we were always together. He was not just my 7 dad; we were best mates. Wherever I was, so was he. 8 Yes, we had our ups and downs, but he will always be my 9 dad. I know he loved me -- always did and always 10 would -- and equally I know that he knew I loved him. 11 I treasure all my memories from the years we had 12 together. The fun and the laughter is something that 13 nothing can take away from me. 14 "I love you, Dad. 15 "Rest in eternal peace. 16 "Lee." 17 MR RICHMOND: The second part of this commemoration is by 18 Cordelia Disson and her family and I am going to ask 19 them now to come to the podium. 20 Morning, Gary. Can you make sure that this is in 21 front of your face because otherwise no one is going to 22 hear you. 23 MR BROMELOW: This one here? 24 MR RICHMOND: Yes, that's the one. 25 MR BROMELOW: Thank you.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 15</p>
<p>1 "On that fateful day, in the early hours of the 2 morning, I got a call from my cousin telling me to 3 switch on the news. When I saw what was happening, 4 I drove from Peterborough to Grenfell Tower. I went 5 around everywhere, putting my dad's name down as 6 missing. I was in constant contact with his sisters as 7 I tried to find out what had happened. He had lived 8 very high up in the building and he had a condition 9 called osteochondroma which could make walking difficult 10 and painful for him. I know as I have it too. My heart 11 was sinking, but I prayed that Dad had got out or that 12 he wasn't home that night. In time, we learnt that Dad 13 had lost his life in the fire. He died from carbon 14 monoxide poisoning. 15 "Hopefully he is looking down on all his children, 16 his grandchildren and his great-grandchildren, with 17 another one expected this November. He was a very 18 special person and I would like him to be remembered for 19 who he was when he was alive. He was always there to 20 help anyone, no matter who you were or where you came 21 from. When the tower is eventually knocked down, 22 I would like for there to be a memorial garden and a 23 waterfall there, with the names of each and every one 24 who lost their lives, in the heart of West London, where 25 Dad was born, where he lived his life and where he died.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 14</p>	<p>1 MR RICHMOND: Before we start, I know of course that you are 2 the solicitor to the family, but perhaps you would like 3 to introduce who else is on stage. 4 MR BROMELOW: On stage we have Cordelia, who was 5 Tony Disson's wife. We also have his son Charlie with 6 us this morning, and we have Leanda Anderson here, who 7 is to support Cordelia. 8 Not in the room with us is Alfie Disson -- he 9 follows us from elsewhere in the building -- and also we 10 have Harry Disson, who is following us from elsewhere as 11 well. 12 Good morning, everybody. I'm here to introduce the 13 film made by the family of Anthony Disson, better known 14 to those who knew him well as Tony Disson. The film has 15 been made by his family. One of her dreams as</p> <p>2 a child was to travel abroad and become a pop star. The</p> <p>3 former she achieved at the young age of 16. Zainab had</p> <p>4 it all; she was beautiful, smart, warm, caring and</p> <p>5 a confident and outgoing young woman. His photograph is up:</p> <p>20 "Our beautiful grandson Jeremiah Deen was born on</p> <p>21 4 December 2014 at the Chelsea and Westminster Hospital</p> <p>22 in London. He attended the Clare Garden nursery until</p> <p>23 14 June 2017, when his sweet life was cut short with</p> <p>24 that of his mother Zainab by the Grenfell Tower fire.</p> <p>25 "He was loved by all and was very overprotected by</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 19</p>
<p>1 MR MANSFIELD: Yes, good morning on behalf of the family.</p> <p>2 There is Shane and Olivia, who are solicitors</p> <p>3 representing, and if I can start the other side, here is</p> <p>4 the father, Zainu and the grandfather. It was a mother</p> <p>5 and son who died in this flat. The mother is sitting</p> <p>6 here. Hannah, and then there's Maria here who is with</p> <p>7 Zainu. In addition, there's a helper sitting just</p> <p>8 behind me here, who is a nephew, and he is going to</p> <p>9 help -- and it is the reason I shall go rather more</p> <p>10 slowly -- with interpreting or certainly translating</p> <p>11 some of the words that I use into Krio, a language in</p> <p>12 Sierra Leone and other parts of Africa. So that's why</p> <p>13 you'll hear occasionally a little assistance between the</p> <p>14 two of them.</p> <p>15 Having said that, I'll read them in the order in</p> <p>16 which you've announced them, with Zainab first.</p> <p>17 MR RICHMOND: Thank you.</p> <p>18 MR MANSFIELD: "We often say the hour of death cannot be</p> <p>19 forecast. When we say this, we mean that we do not know</p> <p>20 when we are going to die and believe this time to be in</p> <p>21 the very distant future. We never thought we would be</p> <p>22 thinking of Zainab Deen as a memory like we are today.</p> <p>23 "Since her birth in Sierra Leone on 25 May 1985,</p> <p>24 Zainab spent her childhood years in the country's</p> <p>25 capital, Freetown, where she obtained both her primary</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 18</p>	<p>1 his mother, who loved him very much. He was loving,</p> <p>2 full of life, liked playing football and loved exploring</p> <p>3 and adventuring.</p> <p>4 "We cannot dwell on the sadness or keep asking the</p> <p>5 question why this happened to our family.
